



UW SYSTEM FACTS

ENROLLMENT

- More than 160,000 students enrolled in the fall 2004 semester.
- More than one-fifth (34,035) of UW System students are 25 years of age and older; 18.5% of official enrollment (29,789) is comprised of nontraditional students.

ACCESS

- 32% of students graduating high school in Wisconsin in 2003 enrolled at a UW System campus for fall 2003.
- In 2003-04, UW System institutions offered 1,109 distance education courses.

DEGREE TRENDS

- In 2003-04, the UW System conferred 30,534 bachelor's, master's, doctoral, and professional degrees.
- Women earned more than 57.5% of degrees in 2003-04.
- 62.1% of the 1998 freshman class graduated in six years or less.

FINANCIAL AID

- More than 98,000 students received some form of financial aid in 2003-04.
- In 2003-04, federal sources provided 81% of financial aid.
- The Pell Grant program provided \$71.8 million to 29,783 students in 2003-04.
- 30.2% of financial aid recipients received a Pell Grant in 2003-04. The average grant was \$2,410.
- The average loan debt for a Wisconsin resident receiving a bachelor's degree in 2003-04 was \$17,253.
- The student loan default rate for the UW System was 2.5% in 2002-03, well below the national average of 5.2%.

WiSys – An Overview of Activities

WiSys is a non-profit tech transfer organization designated by the UW System to promote research and development by moving university discoveries to industry through intellectual property protection and marketing. WiSys resources are available to all System faculty, staff, and students. Major functions of WiSys include:

- 1) Assessment of inventions and patent protection of marketable discoveries
- 2) Broad commercialization of technologies and sharing of income with inventors, campus, and System administration
- 3) Encouraging innovation and intellectual property education
- 4) Assistance with inter-campus research collaboration
- 5) Assistance with technology based business growth in Wisconsin

WiSys was founded in 2000, and as of January 2006, a total of 174 inventions have been received from System campuses.

About fifty of these inventions are being protected and have advanced to marketing status. WiSys is also proactive in identifying faculty with suitable expertise that may be useful in developing marketable technologies. About 500 faculty members have been contacted to inform them of the services WiSys has to offer and to encourage them to develop inventions. We are also working with the UW System Federal Relations office to advance collaboration between faculty members and to encourage them to apply for System, state, and federal grants. Some highlights of our 2005 activities include:

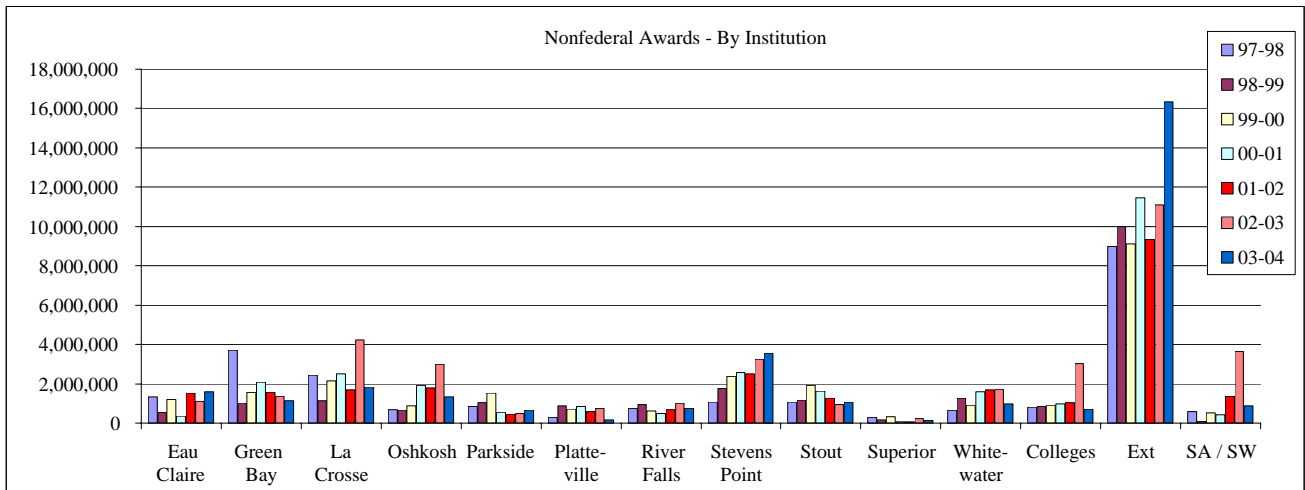
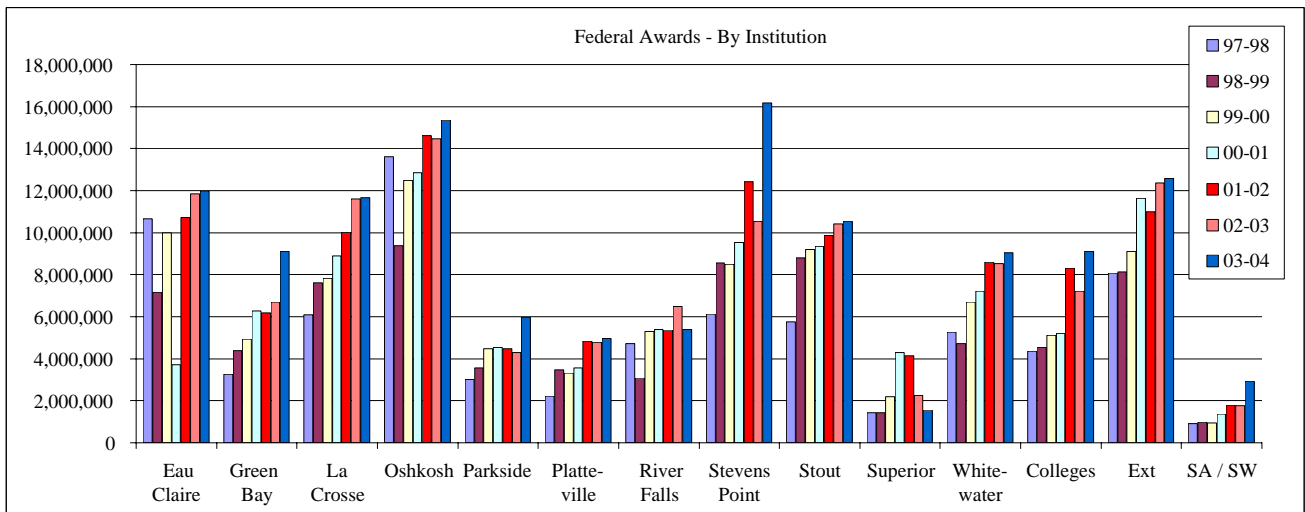
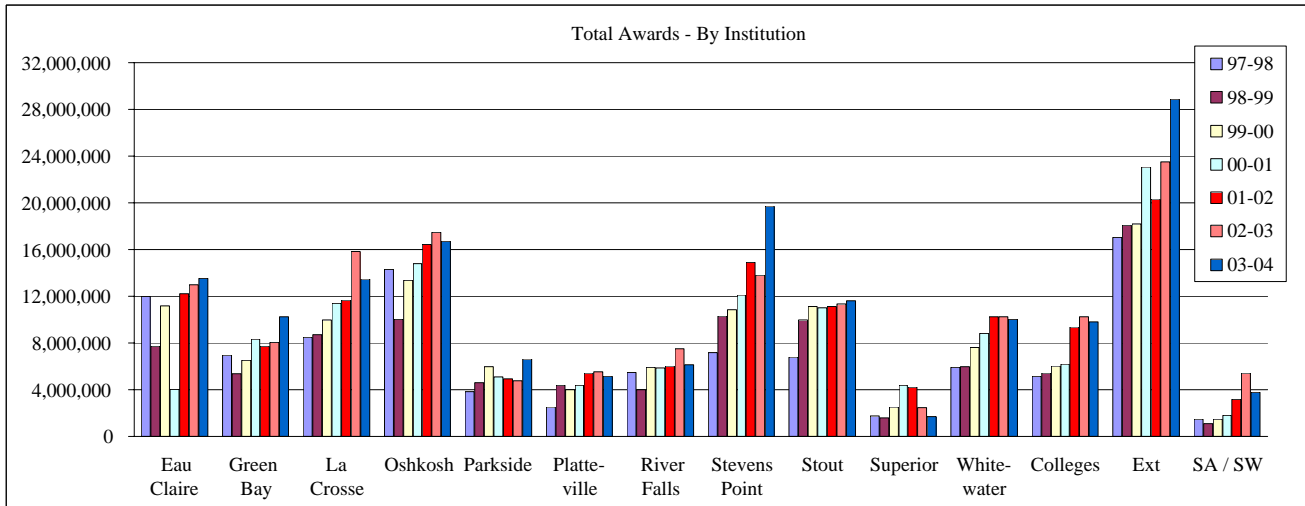
- An anxiolytic therapeutic developed by UW Milwaukee Professor James Cook was licensed for further clinical development by a pharmaceutical industry.
- Fluorescent probes to detect cholesterol developed by UW Eau Claire professors David Lewis and Scott Hartsel were licensed by a research tool company.
- A method to convert animal manure to plant growth media useful for nurseries or greenhouses developed by UW Platteville professors Tim Zauche and Michael Compton has generated significant commercial interest.
- To recognize and honor practical inventions developed by researchers and students, WiSys selected 6 inventions from various campuses and the inventors received “WiSys Innovation Scholar Awards”.
- Two stem cell training scholarships are being awarded to each System campus by WiSys/WARF and WiCell.

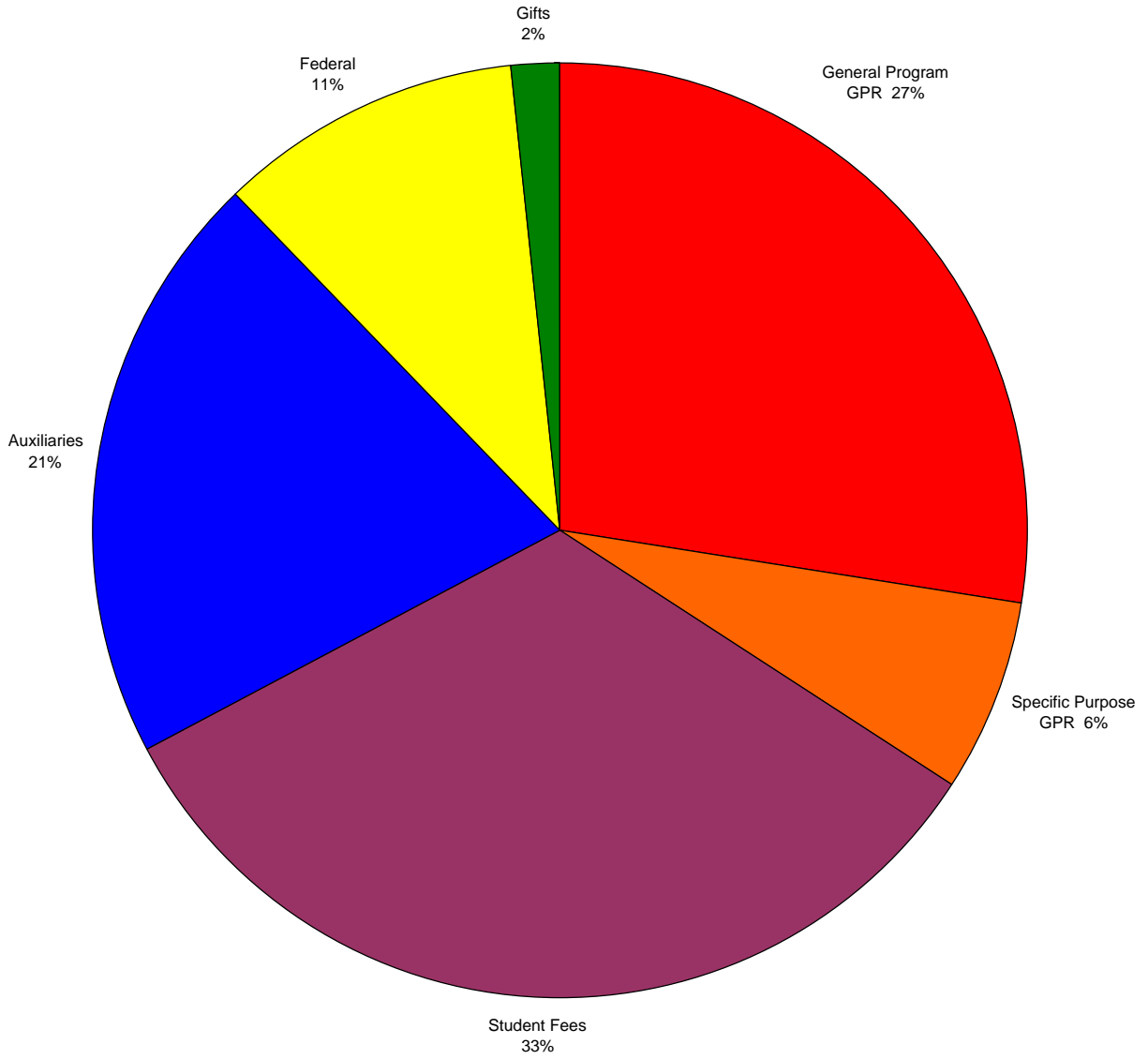

FY 1997-1998 through 2003-2004



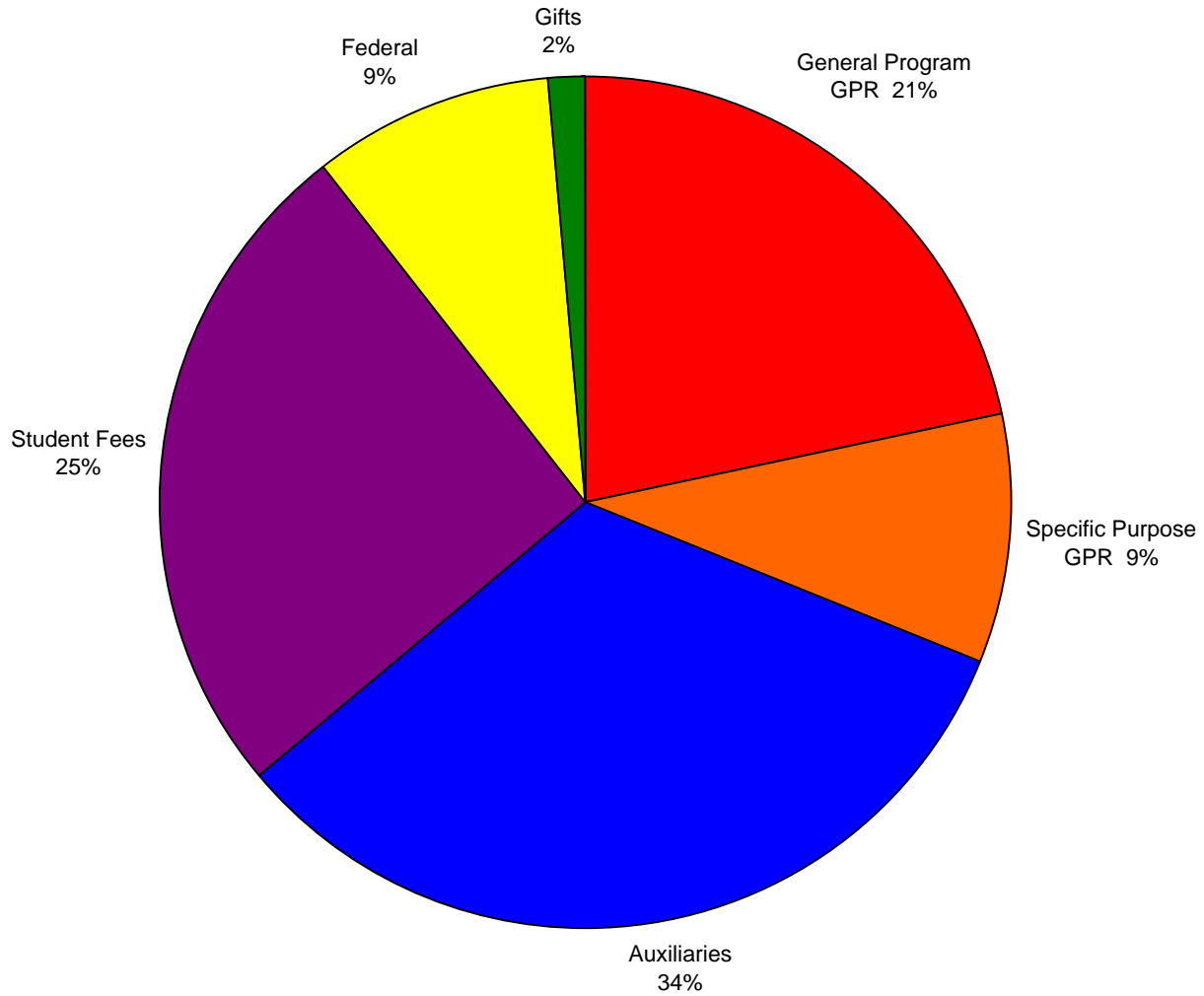

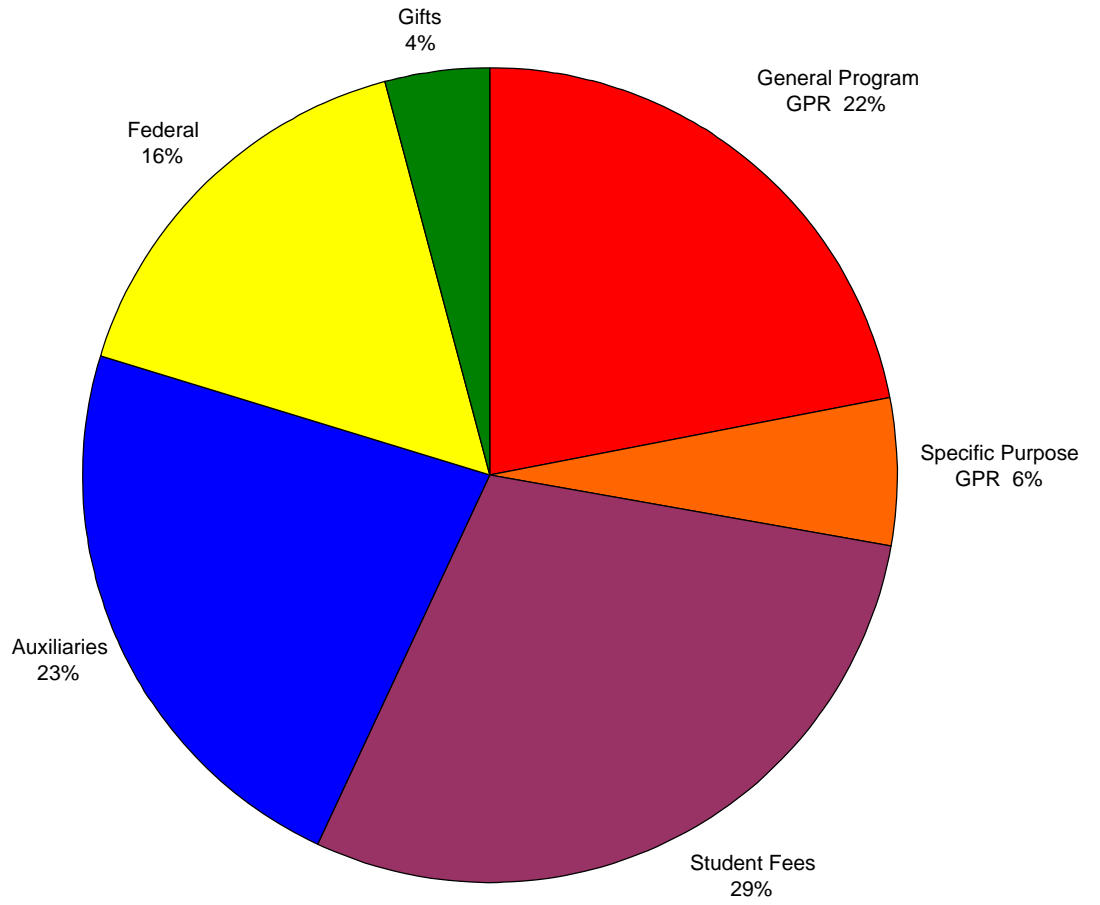
UW-GREEN BAY

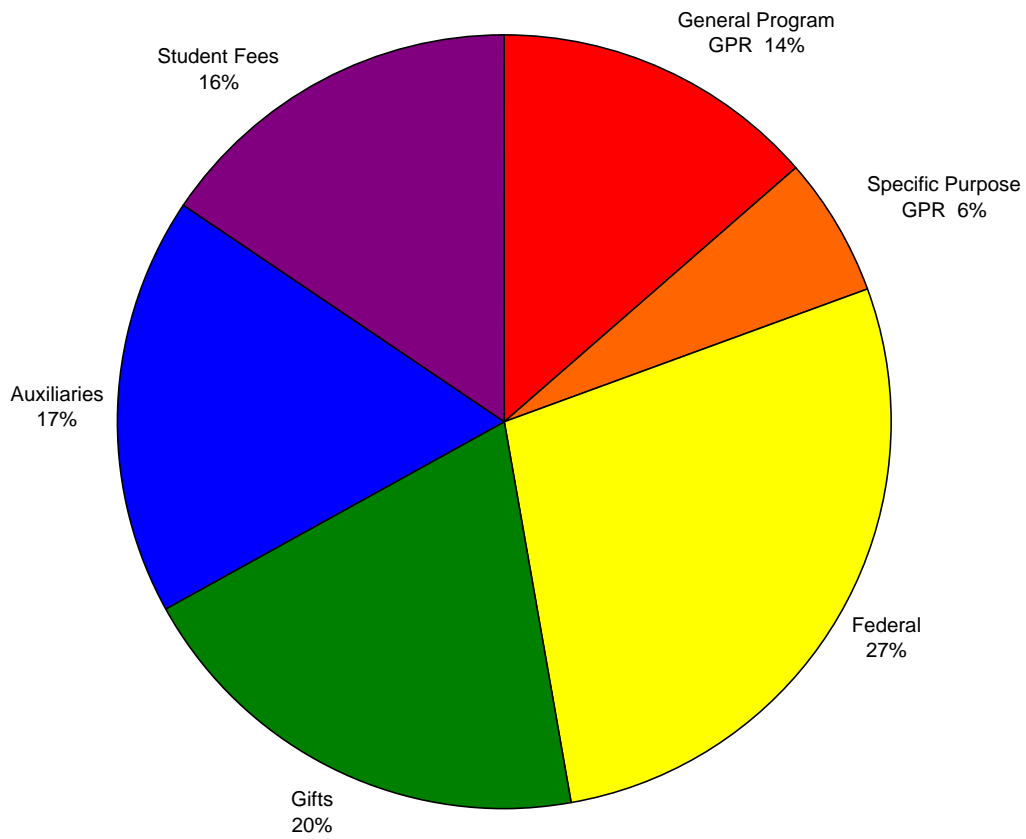
UW-LA CROSSE

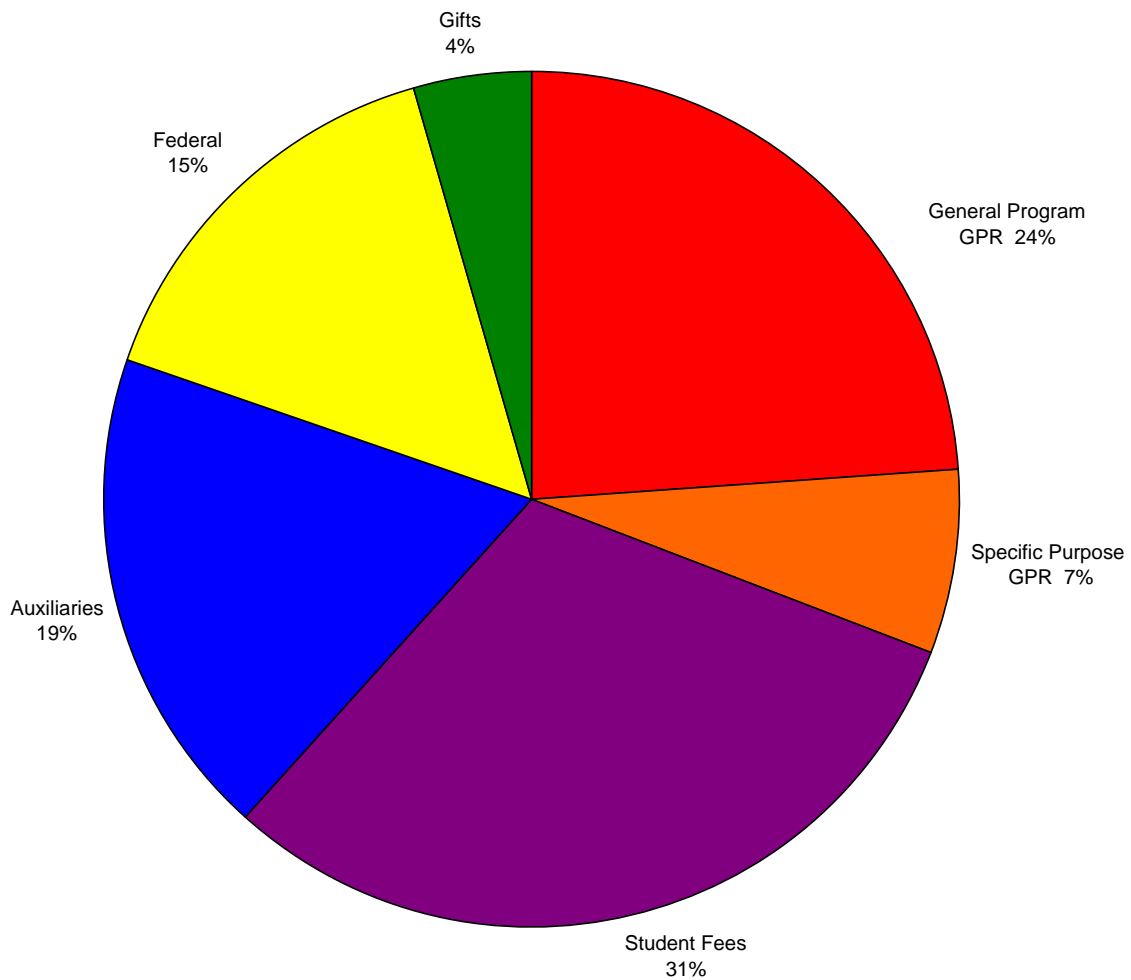
UW-MADISON

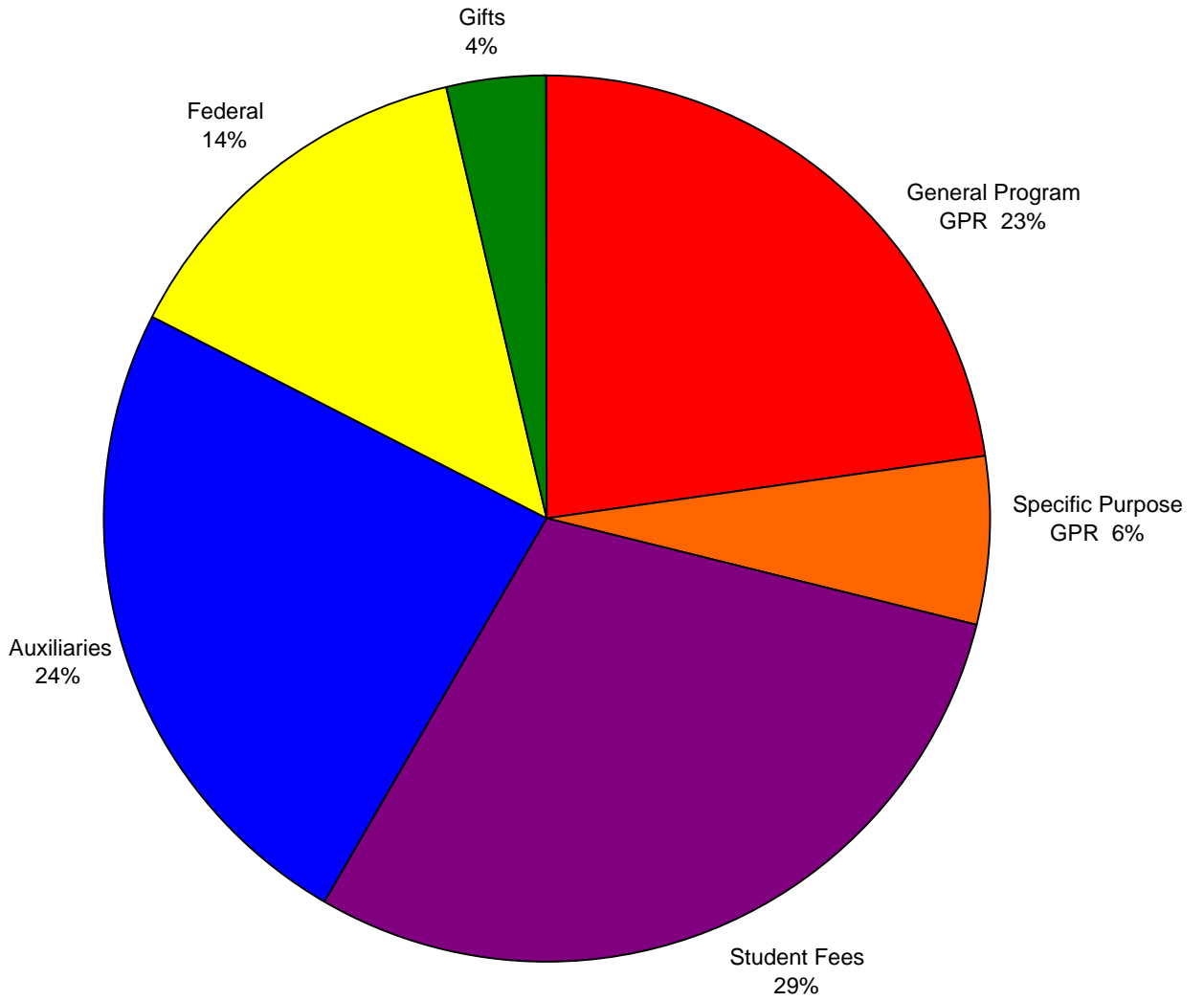

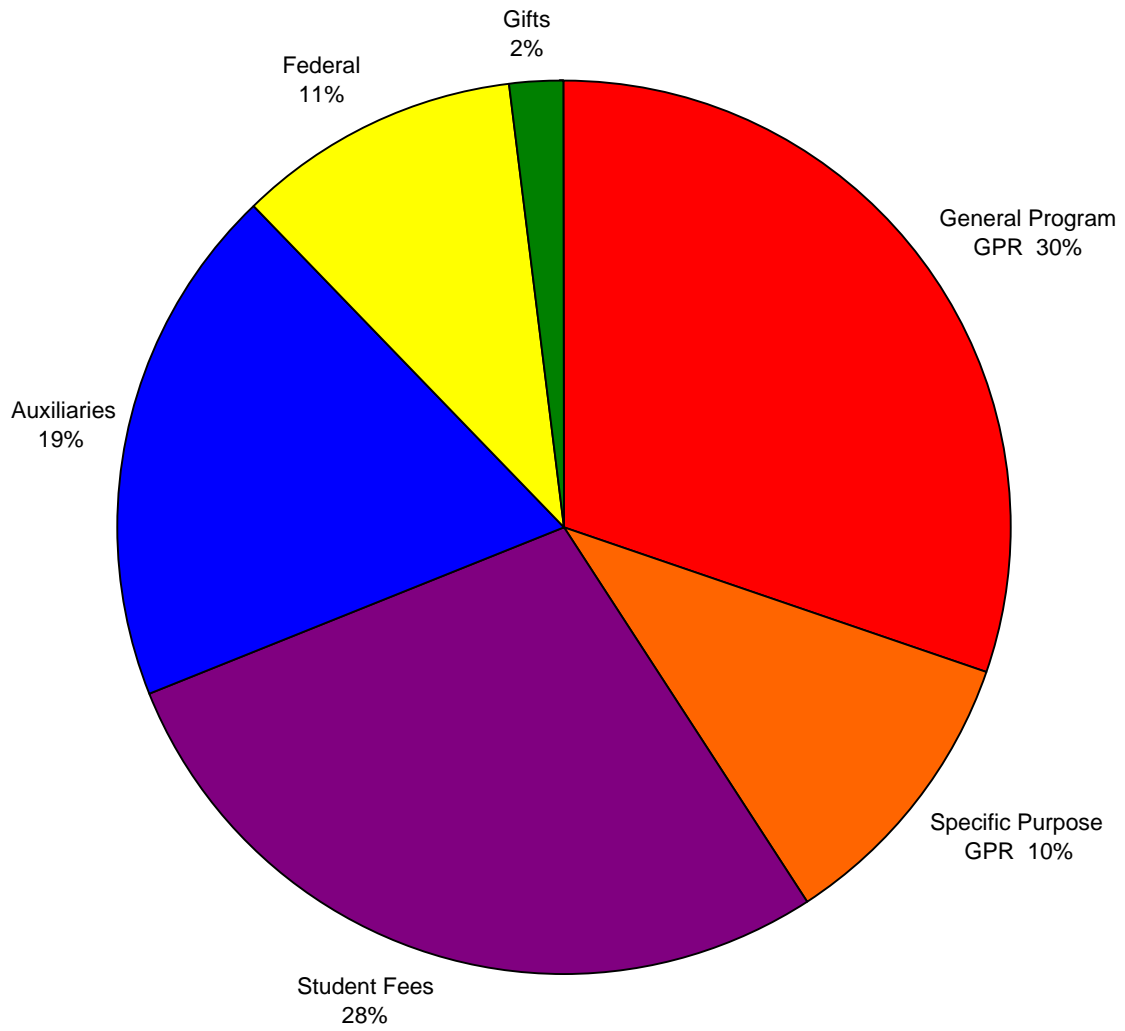

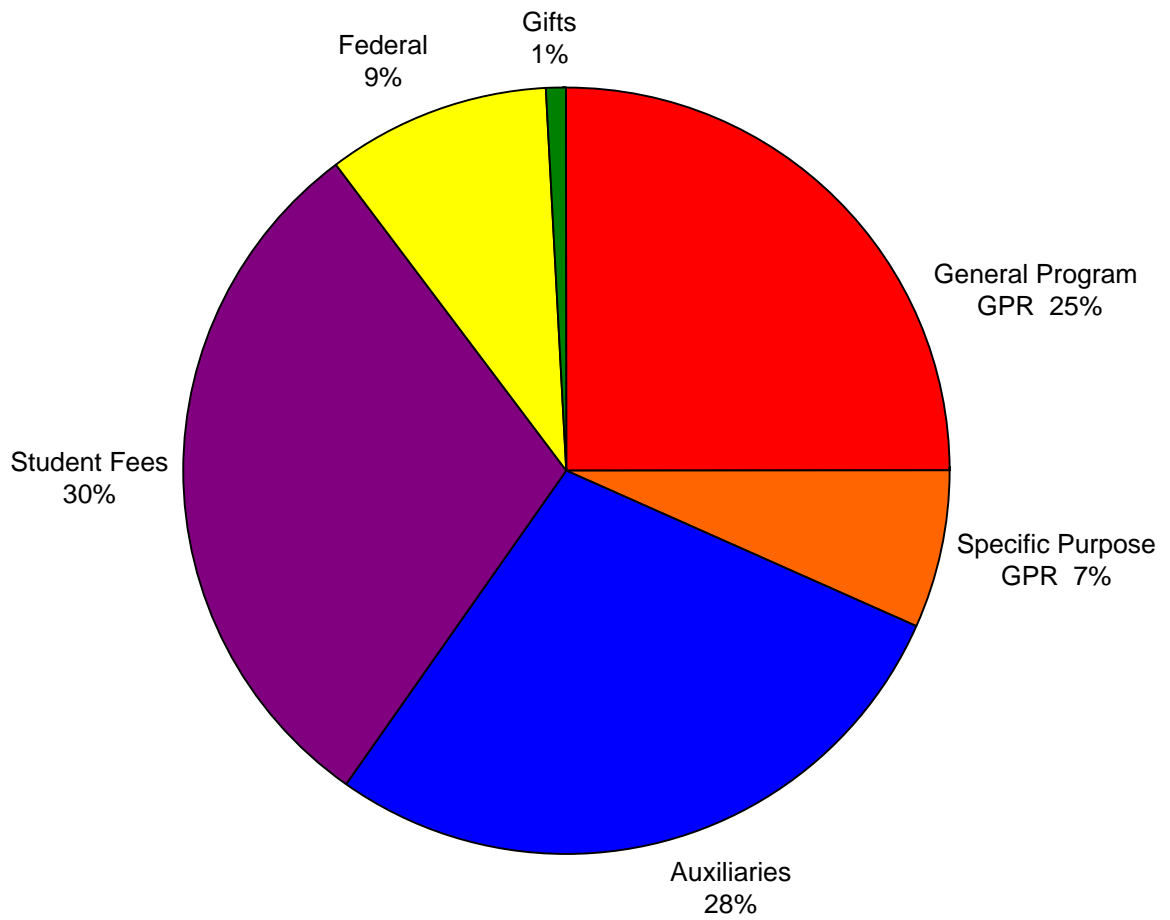

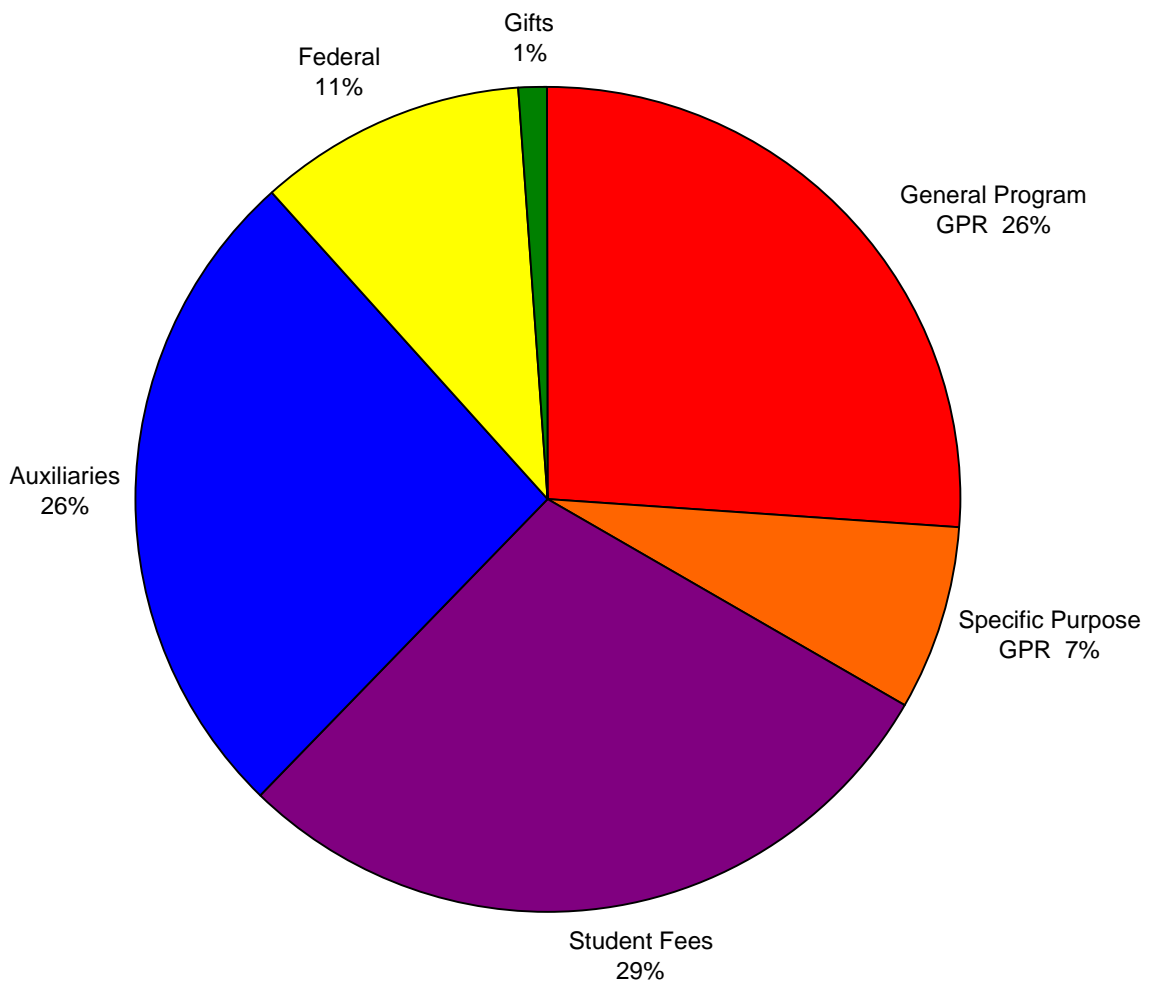

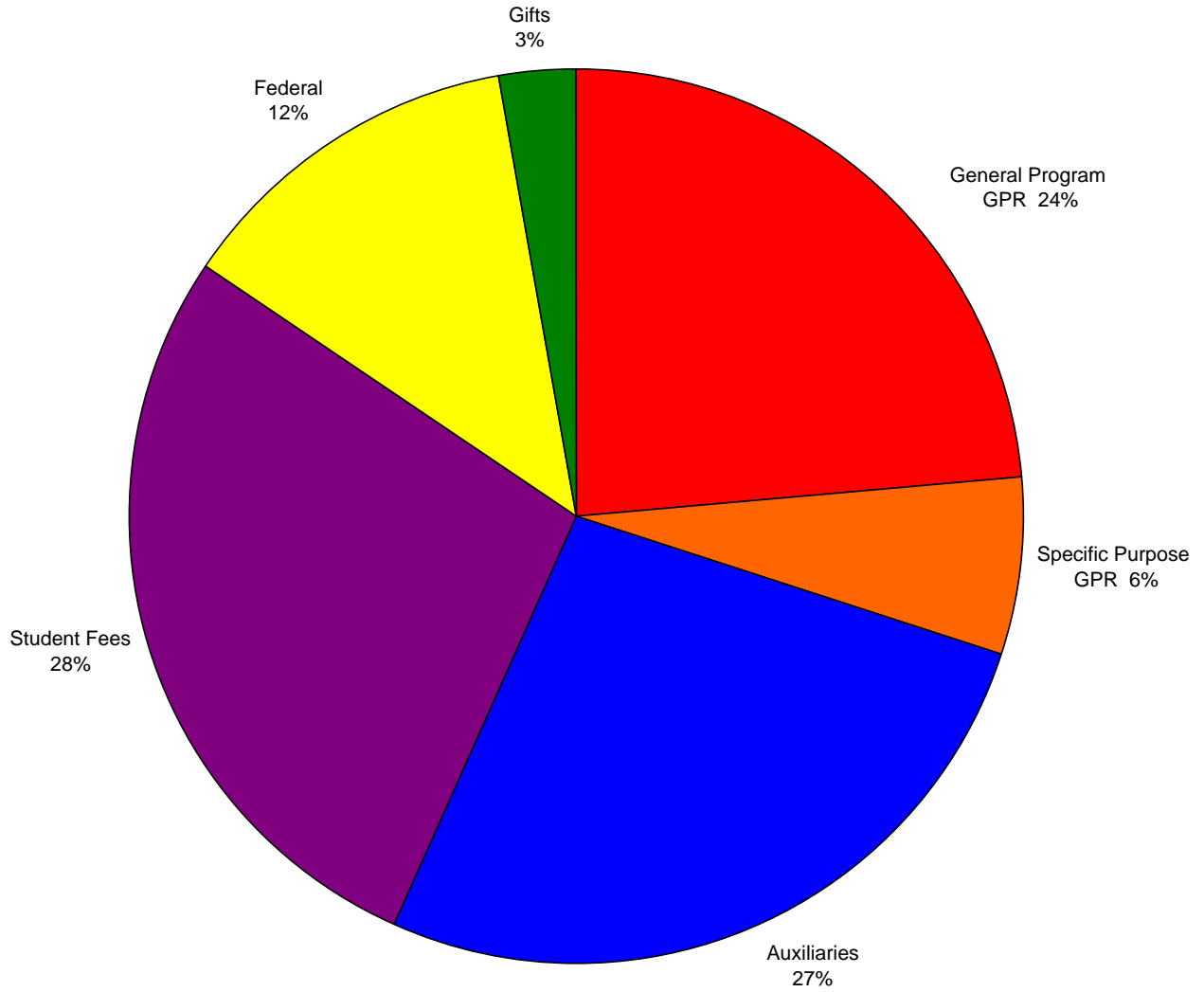
UW-RIVER FALLS

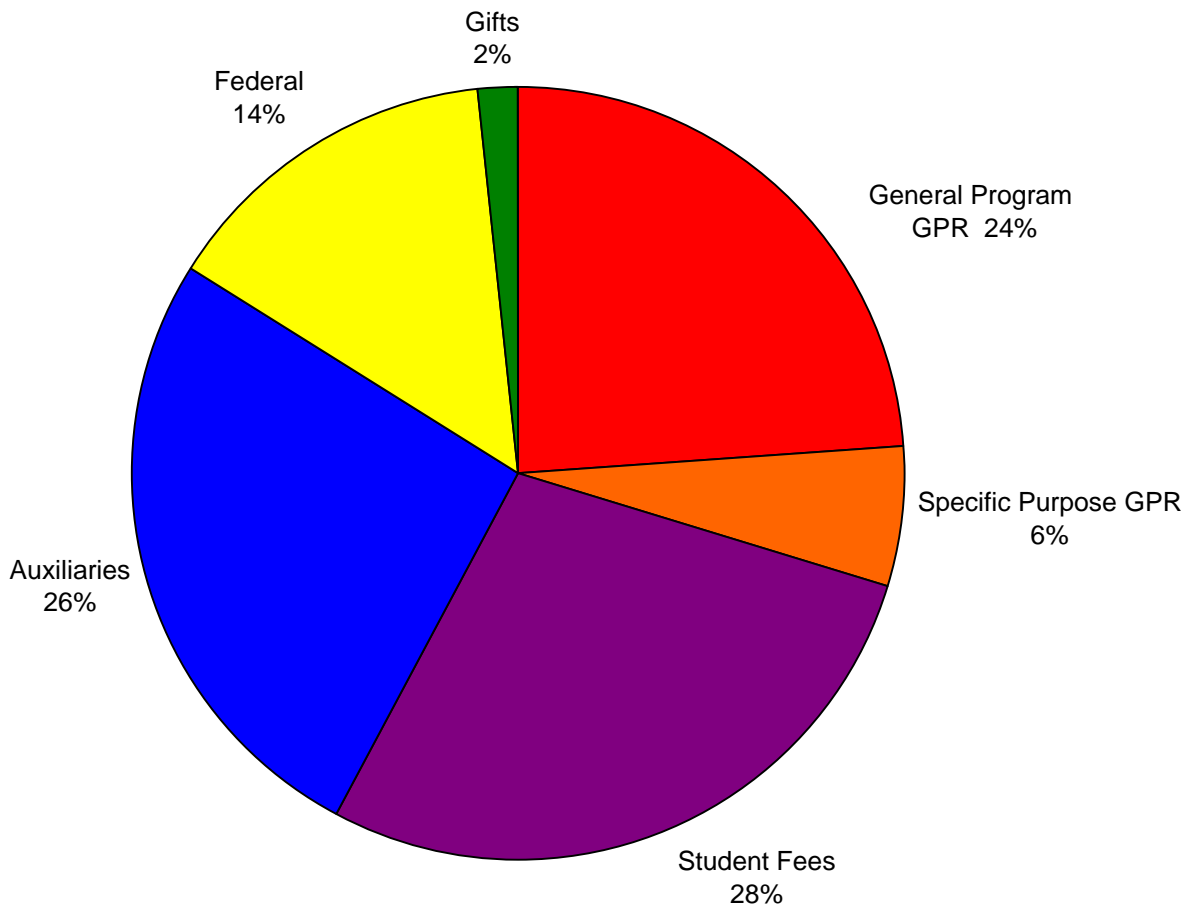
UW-STEVENS POINT

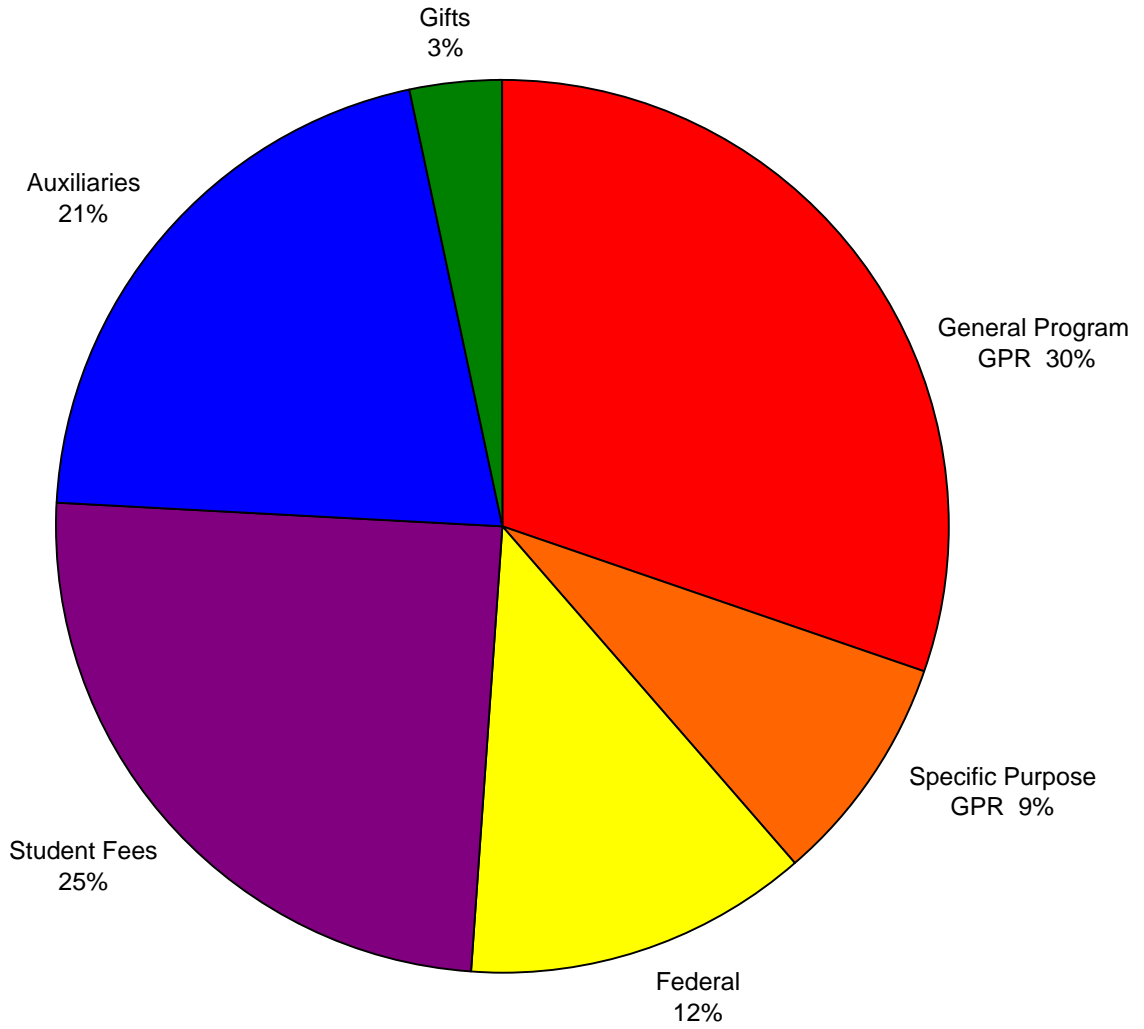

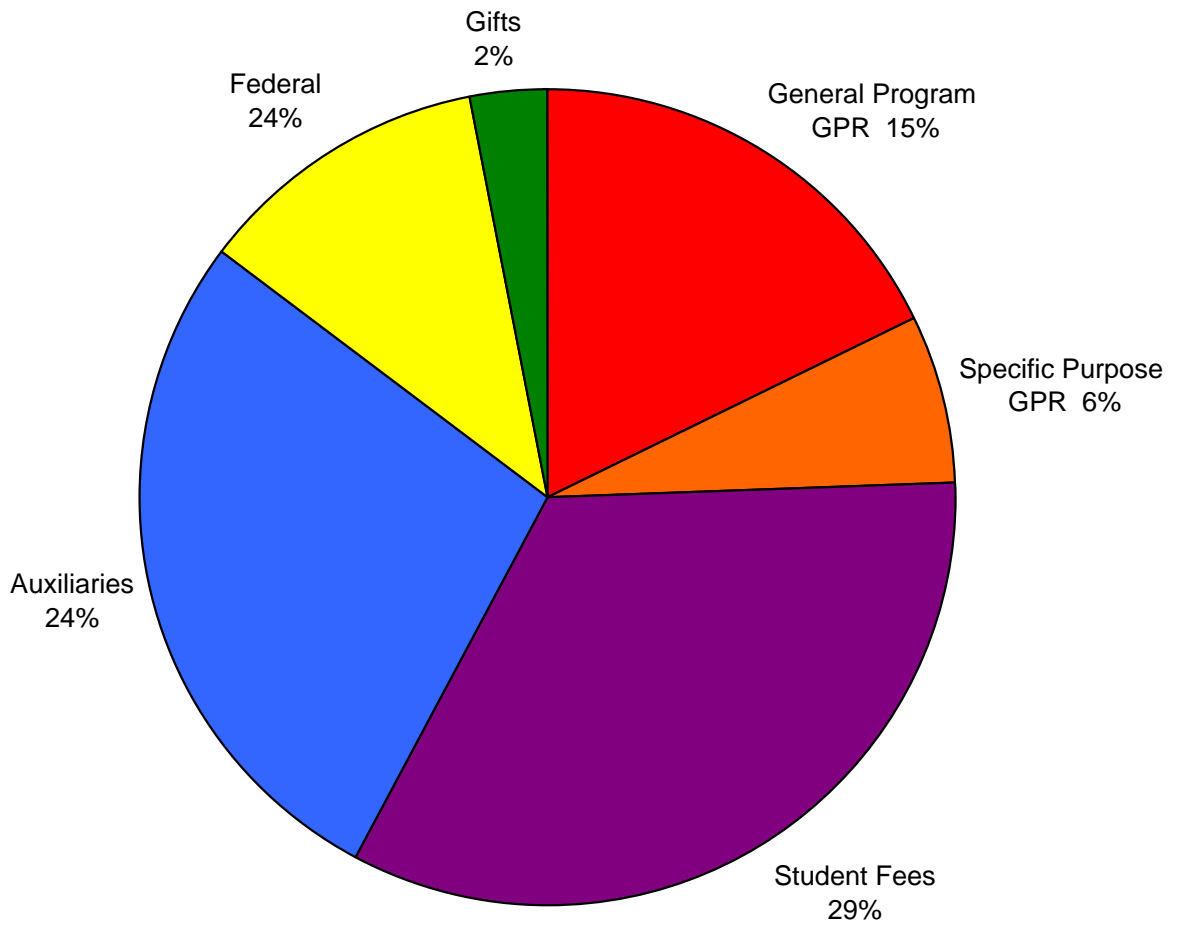
UW-SUPERIOR

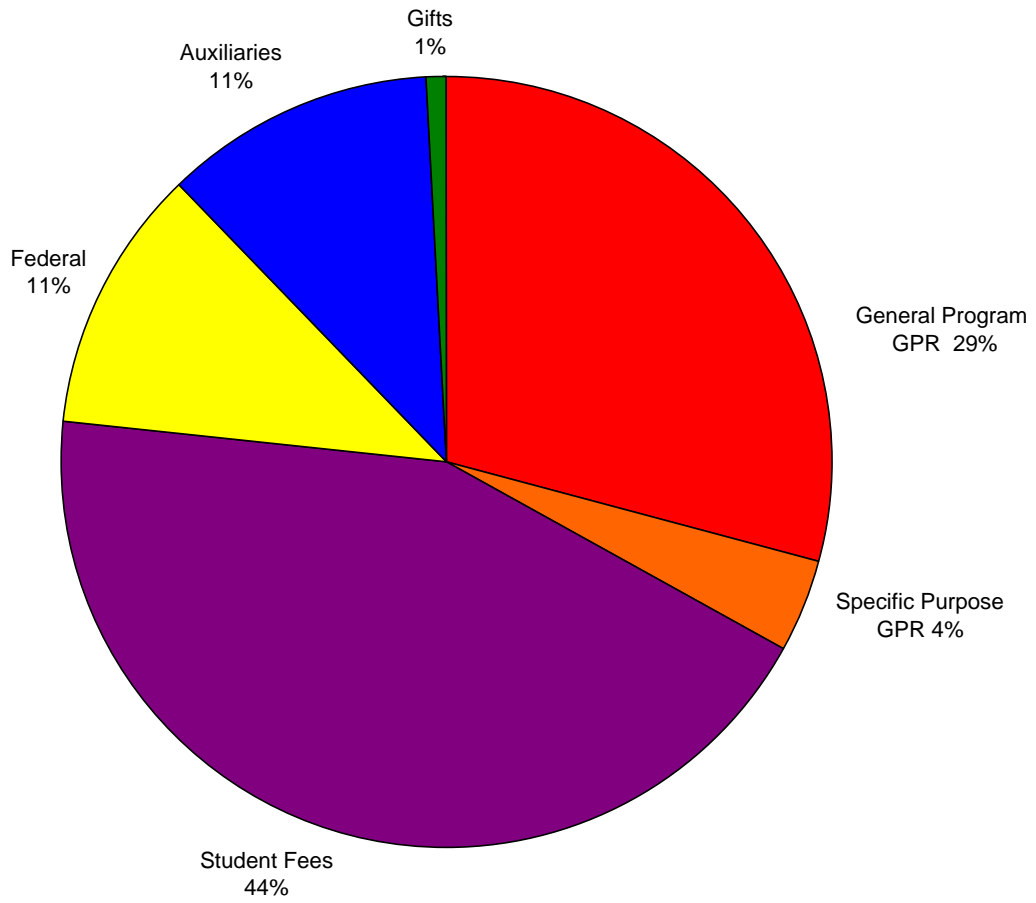
UW-WHITEWATER

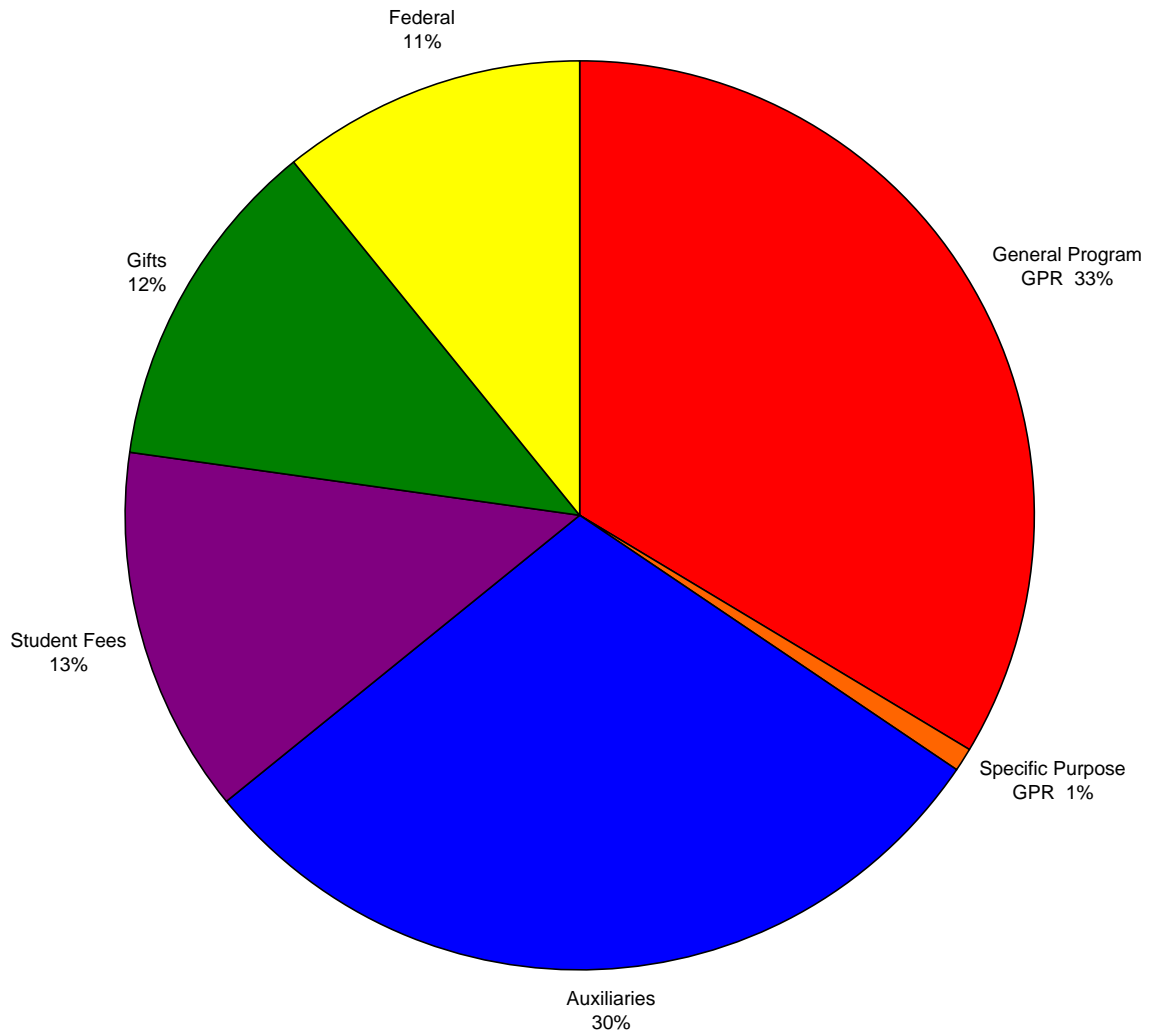
