



## The New Undergraduate Class: Fall 1994

### EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

In Fall 1994, new freshman enrollment in the UW System was down 2.4 percent over the prior year to 22,650, the smallest entering class since merger. The number of students transferring between UW System institutions increased 2.5 percent from Fall 1993 to 3,761 students. The number of transfers entering the UW System from non-UW institutions increased to 4,704, up 5.0 percent from one year ago.

UW System new freshmen continue to demonstrate high levels of academic achievement, as measured by high school rank and ACT scores. The average high school rank of entering new freshmen has steadily increased since 1991 to a record high 69.1 percent for Fall 1994. The proportion who graduated in the top half of their high school class remained at 82 percent. Only 3.5 percent of new freshmen graduated in the bottom quartile, one of the lowest percentages in the past decade. The average ACT composite score of new freshmen was a record high of 22.6 in Fall 1994. The proportion of new freshmen 20 years or younger admitted as exceptions to admissions guidelines was about two percent of all new freshmen, well below the five percent ceiling established in 1987.

In Fall 1994, 7.1 percent (1,605) of new freshmen were minority. There were 547 Asian Americans, 498 African Americans, 401 Hispanic/Latinos, and 159 American Indians. Asian American new freshmen comprised 2.4 percent of all new freshmen; African American, 2.2 percent; Hispanic/Latinos, 1.8 percent, and American Indians .7 percent.

Transfer students made up one quarter (8,465) of all new institutional undergraduate matriculants. Almost half (44%) of these were transferring between UW System institutions.

Of the 4,704 new transfers enrolling for the first time in the UW System, 1,079 came from a Wisconsin Technical College System institution, and 563 from other Wisconsin private institutions. The remaining 3,062 transferred from out-of-state or other institutions. Half of the out-of-state students were Wisconsin residents returning home to continue their college education.

In Fall 1994, 53 percent of all degree-seeking undergraduates were female and 47 percent were male. Eighty-two percent of these students were 18-24 years of age and 85 percent enrolled full-time. Freshmen, sophomores, juniors and seniors were distributed in similar proportions (28%, 23%, 20% and 29% respectively).

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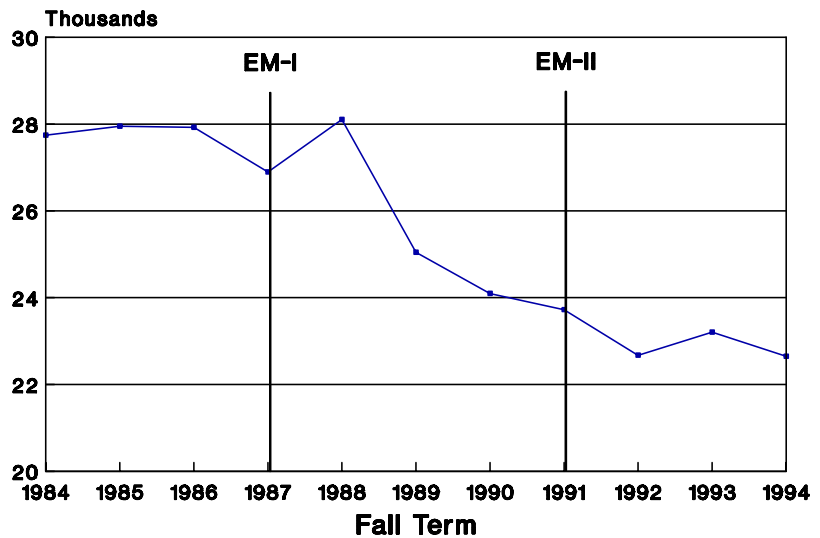
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**SECTION I:  
NEW FRESHMEN**

**Trends in New Freshman Enrollment**

In Fall 1994, 22,650 new freshmen enrolled in the UW System, down 2.4 percent from one year ago. This is the smallest freshman class since merger and more than 5,000 smaller than the entering class ten years earlier (Figure 1). The pool of Wisconsin high school graduates in 1994 was also the smallest in the last decade. The size of the Wisconsin high school graduating class is expected to increase beginning with the class of 1995. (See Appendix A for new freshman enrollments by institution.)

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**Residency of New Freshmen**

In accordance with the UW System mission, Wisconsin residents make up the vast majority of new freshmen in the UW System (Table 1). In Fall 1994, 82.5 percent of new freshmen were Wisconsin residents, and most (89%) of those entered immediately after graduation from high school.

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The proportion of new freshmen who enroll under the Minnesota reciprocity compact increased to 9.1 percent in Fall 1994, up from 7.9 percent last year. The proportion of other nonresident new freshmen (8.4% in Fall 1994) fluctuated at about 8 percent, with the exception of Fall 1988 when UW-Madison enrolled an unusually large cohort of nonresident new freshmen (Table 1).

Nonresident and Minnesota Compact new freshman percentages increased slightly.

Among UW System institutions, UW-Madison had the most nonresident freshmen enrolled in Fall 1994. (Table 2). UW-Madison, followed by UW-River Falls, UW-Eau Claire, UW-Stout and UW-La Crosse, enrolled the greatest numbers of Minnesota Compact freshmen. As a proportion of total new freshman enrollment, UW-River Falls, UW-Superior, and UW-Stout led other UW System institutions in Minnesota Compact freshmen at 43.0, 32.6, and 26.4 percent respectively.

by Race/Ethnicity**

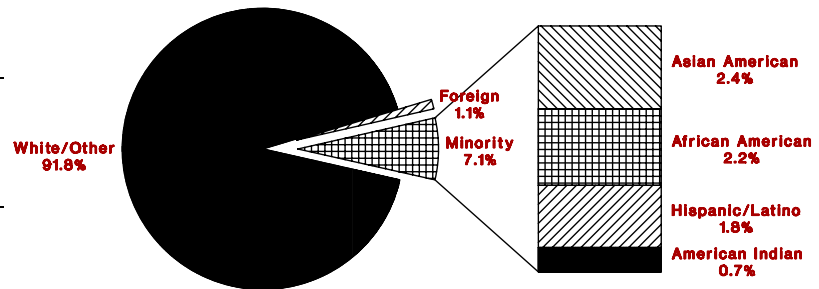
There were 1,605 minorities enrolled as new freshmen in Fall 1994 (Figure 2/Appendix B). Asian Americans constituted 2.4 percent of the new freshman enrollment compared with 2.2 percent for African Americans in Fall 1994. Hispanic/Latinos and American Indians remained similar to Fall 1993 at 1.8 percent and 0.7 percent respectively. Foreign students were 1.1 percent of new freshman enrollment, and White new freshmen were 91.8 percent of all new freshmen in Fall 1994 (Figure 2). UW-Milwaukee continued to lead all other UW System institutions in the proportion of its new freshmen who are minorities (18.6%), followed by UW-Parkside (16.4%) (Institutional percentages are available in Appendix B).

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*7.1% of new freshmen were minority.*

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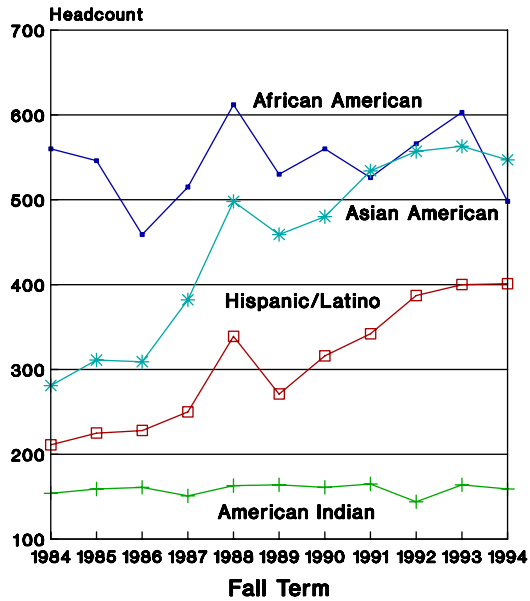

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*Asian Americans comprised the largest share of minority new freshmen.*

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For the first time, Asian Americans comprised the largest segment of minority new freshmen at 547, although declining from the all-time high of 563 in Fall 1993 (Figure 3). The number of African American new freshmen enrolled in the UW System declined significantly in Fall 1994 to 498. The number of Hispanic/Latino new freshmen remained stable at 401 in Fall 1994. Enrollment of American Indians, at 159, has remained nearly level since 1985.

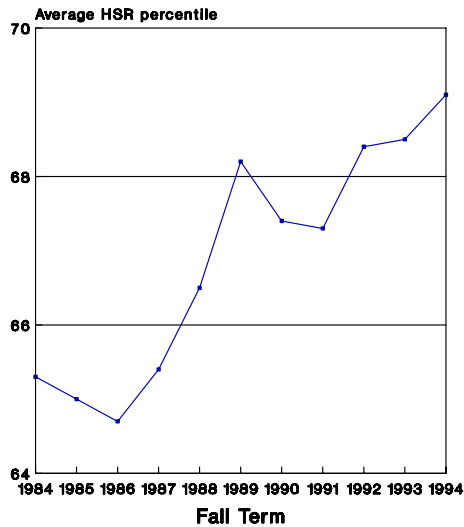

**High School Percentile Rank**

The average high school rank of the Fall 1994 new freshman class was 69.1 percent, increasing .6 percentage points from one year ago (Figure 4). The average high school rank has been steadily increasing since Fall 1991. These data include all freshmen for whom high school rank data were available. (Appendix C provides high school rank averages for each institution)

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*The Fall 1994 new freshman class had the highest average high school rank ever, 69.1.*

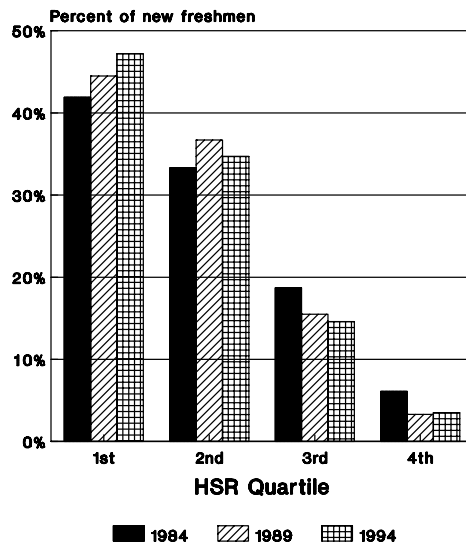
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## High School Quartile

The Fall 1994 new freshman class had the highest proportion ever (47.2%) from the top quartile of their high school class (Figure 5). The proportion of new freshmen from the bottom quartile of their high school class declined from 6.1 percent in Fall 1984 to 3.5 percent in Fall 1994.

Figure 6 shows that the Systemwide proportion of new freshmen who graduated in the top half of their high school class has been increasing since Fall 1984, and remained steady at 81.9 percent in Fall 1994. (Institutional data is available in Appendix D.)

**Fall 1984, Fall 1989 and Fall 1994**

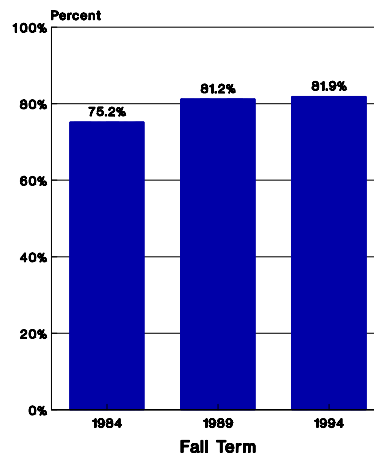

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## ACT Test Scores

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The ACT test became an admission requirement to UW System institutions for Wisconsin residents in 1989 and ACT scores were included in Systemwide data collection that year. The ACT composite score for UW new freshmen reached a high of 22.6 for Fall 1994 (Table 3). The average for all Wisconsin test-takers also increased slightly compared to previous years, from 21.8 to 21.9, as did the average for the nation at large (from 20.7 to 20.8).

## Admission Category of New Freshmen

In Fall 1994, the proportion of new freshmen admitted as exceptions (2.3%) (Table 4) remained well below the 5 percent cap established in 1987. Exceptions include students 20 and younger who do not meet regular institutional admission requirements as described in the UW System publication Introduction to the University of Wisconsin System. (Admission exception percentages by institution are shown in Appendix E.)

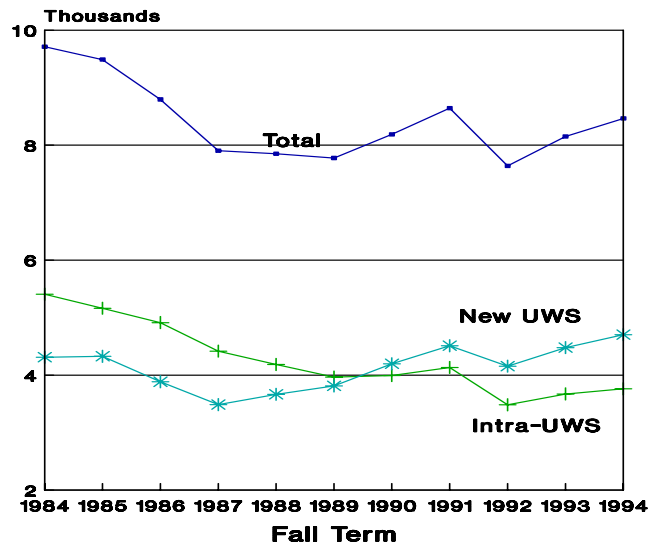

**SECTION II:  
New Undergraduate  
Transfers**

The number of undergraduate transfers in Fall 1994 increased to 8,465, 3.9 percent higher than Fall 1993 (Figure 7). The number of undergraduate transfers fluctuated around 8,000 under Enrollment Management, compared to 9,000 to 10,000 in the early 1980s. The number of undergraduates transferring for the first time into the UW System (new UWS transfers) increased under Enrollment Management, while the number of intra-UWS transfers declined. (Undergraduate transfers by institution are available in Appendix F.)

Both intra-UWS and new UWS transfers increased in Fall 1994.

Transfers comprise one in six new entrants in The UW System each year. Almost half of all transfers are from within the UW System. Transfers as a proportion of all new undergraduates dropped to 21.8 percent by Fall 1988, but then increased steadily to reach 27.2 percent in Fall 1994, the highest proportion in the last decade (Table 5).

**Transfers by Type of Institution**

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*Intra-UWS transfers were 44 percent of all transfers.*

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*Intra-UWS transfers showed decreasing trend during Enrollment Management*

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UW System transfers, except those transferring from UW four-year institutions to UW-Centers and from foreign institutions, increased in Fall 1994 (Table 6). Transfers between four-year institutions represented the largest segment of all intra-UWS transfers (1,972). Transfers moving from UW-Centers to four-year institutions represented the second largest segment of intra-UWS transfers (1,531). Although the total number of intra-UWS transfers increased slightly in the past couple of years, the percent of intra-UWS transfers decreased steadily over the past decade (56 percent in Fall 1984 to 44 percent in Fall 1994). In Fall 1994, the percent of intra-UWS transfers from Centers to four-year institutions increased slightly (+86, 2%), while the percent of transfers from four-year institutions to Centers decreased slightly (-61, -2%).

At 2,885, transfers from out-of-state institutions constituted the largest single source of all *new* UWS transfers. The number of transfers from the Wisconsin Technical College System (WTCS) continued to increase in Fall 1994 (1,079), up 58 percent since the beginning of Enrollment Management. This growth reflects UW System's ongoing commitment to program articulation with the WTCS sector. The transfers from Wisconsin private and out-of-state institutions also increased (+224, 1%) as a proportion of total new transfers in Fall 1994.

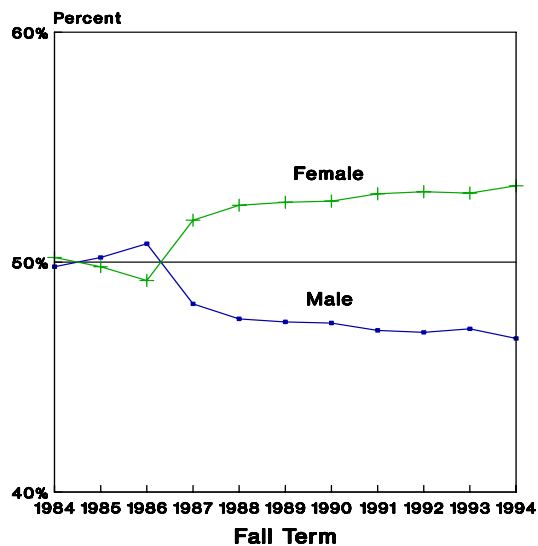

**Gender of Degree-Seeking Undergraduates**

*53% of undergraduate degree-seekers were female.*

Female degree-seeking undergraduates increased above 53 percent of the total undergraduates, while the male degree-seeking undergraduates declined to below 47 percent of the total in Fall 1994 (Figure 8). (Annual percentages are shown in Appendix G.)

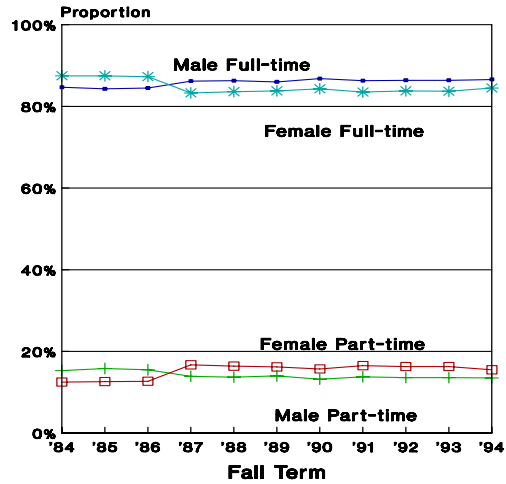

**Gender and Full-time Status**

Overall, the proportion of full-time undergraduate degree-seeking students remained relatively stable (86% in Fall 1984 vs. 85% in Fall 1994). The percentage of full-time undergraduate males increased since 1984 (85% in Fall 1984 to 87% in Fall 1994), while the percent of full-time females decreased (from 88% in Fall 1984 to 85% in Fall 1994) (Figure 9 and Appendix G). The UW institutions varied in their proportion of gender and full-time status students.

**Class Level Distribution**

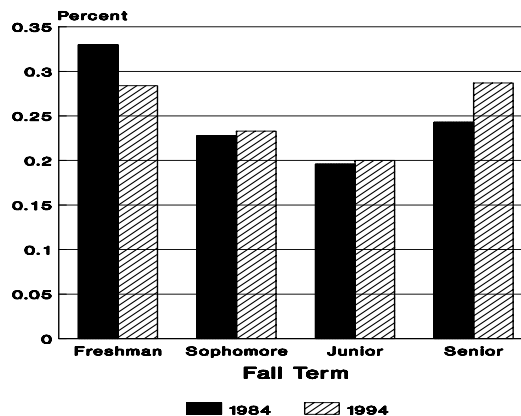
In Fall 1994, seniors comprised 29 percent of all degree-seeking undergraduates, almost equal to the proportion of freshman (28%). Juniors and sophomores represented 20 percent and 23 percent respectively of the undergraduate class. The proportion that are seniors increased 5 percentage points since Fall 1984, while the proportion that are freshmen dropped 5 points. The decrease in freshmen reflects the impact of enrollment management (Figure 10). (Annual percentages are shown in Appendix H.)

## Age at Entrance

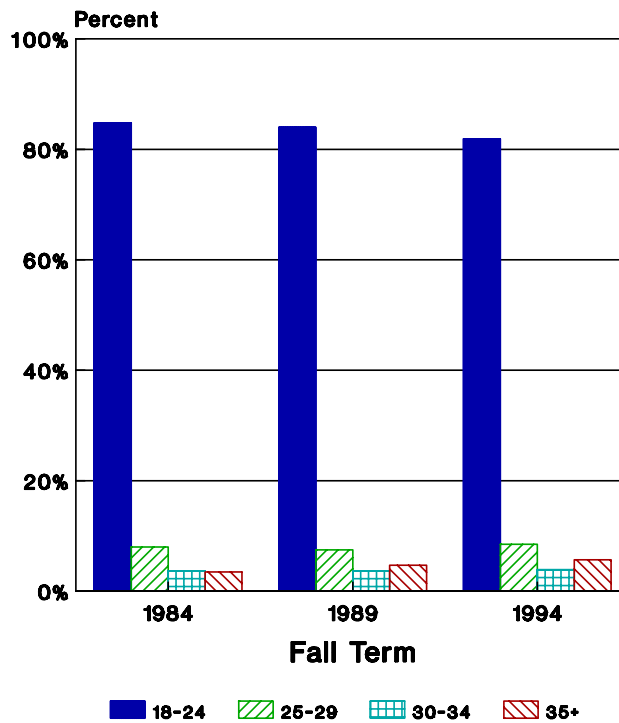
The majority (82%) of Fall 1994 degree-seeking undergraduates were between 18-24 years of age at entrance. The percentage of traditional age students decreased slightly (from 85% in Fall 1984 to 82% in Fall 1994). Simultaneously, the percentage of undergraduate students 35 and over increased from 3.5 percent of all degree-seeking undergraduates in Fall 1984 to 5.7 percent in Fall 1994 (Figure 11). 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Over 80% of degree-seeking undergraduates were 18-24 years old at entrance.
