

Most work full-time, are not first-time college students, and attend on a part-time basis. First-time, full-time students are not prohibited in several Flexible Option programs, but they are exceedingly rare. As such, small numbers such as these are not uncommon and have been consistently reported like this since submitting data to IPEDS.
