Rovy Branor

Rovy Branor is associate dean of Online Learning and Technology within the University of Wisconsin-Extension's Continuing Education, Outreach and E-Learning division. Rovy was appointed as the executive director of the Advanced Distributed Learning Co-Lab in 2007 and is also adjunct faculty in instructional systems technology at Indiana University. He also leads the University of Wisconsin System eCampus, a gateway to 100+ online degree and certificate programs across the 26 campuses of the UW System.

Rovy's professional experience includes more than 17 years of leading teams in instructional multimedia projects, extensive web-based instructional development and research on human performance. He has several published journal articles and has been an invited speaker at numerous conferences.

Rovy graduated summa cum laude with a degree in psychology and completed his master's degree in instructional systems technology at the University of North Carolina at Charlotte. He completed his Ph.D. in instructional systems technology at Indiana University Bloomington.

Marcy has presented at various conferences including pre-conference workshops on "Visual & Video Media" and on "Frolicking with Online Scavenger Hunts" at UW Madison's Distance Teaching and Learning Conference.

Vera Klekovkina

Dr. Klekovkina's research interests are varied and range from 19th to 21st French and Francophone Studies. She works on Marcel Proust's *A la Recherche du temps perdu* and first-person discourse, autobiography and life writing, women's writing (especially Amélie Nothomb and Anna Gavalda), memory and psychology, and technology (from both cultural and pedagogical standpoints). She is also interested in cinema, especially cinematic adaptation and French film history.

Dr. Klekovkina has published several articles and presented her work at the MLA convention and its regional chapters as well as the 20th and 21st Century French and Francophone Studies International Colloquium. She is currently working on a manuscript, entitled *Visual Proust*, which places Proust's canonical text, *A la Recherche du temps perdu*, in a multi-media environment. The cinematic lens opens up the *Recherche* to a new interpretation: an advocate of literature, the narrator is also a theorist of the visual.

Lawrence Leviton is Artist/Teacher of Cello at the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point. He received his Doctorate in cello performance from the University of Wisconsin-Madison. He received his Bachelor of Music degree from the University of Minnesota and his Master's degree in performance from Northwestern University. He also holds a degree in psychology from the University of Illinois. In recent years, Dr. Leviton has spoken throughout the country on the subject of film music. He has presented papers and participated in conferences in Dallas, Albuquerque, Los Angeles, New York, and Madison. He has received several grants to further his study of film music and wrote his Dissertation on the Cello Concerto of noted film composer, Erich Wolfgang Korngold. He has taught the course, Music in Film, at UWSP for the past 20 years in several different distance learning formats-first over the Wonder Network and more recently, in hybrid and fully online course formats. It is one of the first courses of its kind in Wisconsin.
