OVERVIEW

The University of Wisconsin System’s strategic directions for precollege, recruitment, and retention of minority and disadvantaged students enrolled are defined by the principles outlined in the UW System’s Framework for Inclusive Excellence. Inclusive Excellence is both a framework and a change process designed to help UW System institutions establish a comprehensive and well-coordinated set of data-informed systemic actions that focus specifically on fostering greater diversity, equity, inclusion, academic excellence, and accountability at every level of university life. The central premise of Inclusive Excellence holds that UW System colleges and universities need to intentionally integrate their efforts to achieve diversity and inclusion into the core mission, operations and aspects of their institutions—such as their organization’s leadership, academic priorities, student development strategies, quality improvement initiatives, policy and decision-making, day-to-day operations, and organizational cultures—in order to maximize student success. Inclusive Excellence was adopted by the Board of Regents in 2009 as the theoretical framework and operating principles to guide and help define strategic directions for diversity, equity, inclusion and academic excellence across the UW System. All UW institutions have submitted their 2014-15 Minority and Disadvantaged (M/D) Expenditure reports. The following analysis is derived from information that has been verified by each UW institution and was reviewed by UWSA to ensure accuracy. In addition, these reports were checked against the 2013-14 reported expenditures for M/D activities. The following sections provide a high-level overview of UW System M/D funding and expenditures, along with details on significant M/D expenditure changes at certain UW institutions.

OVERVIEW OF UW SYSTEM M/D FUNDING (2014-15)

Chart 1 summarizes the total UW System M/D spending by source, while Table 1 summarizes M/D spending across UW institutions. The UW System spent a total of approximately \$64 million on M/D programs in 2014-15.

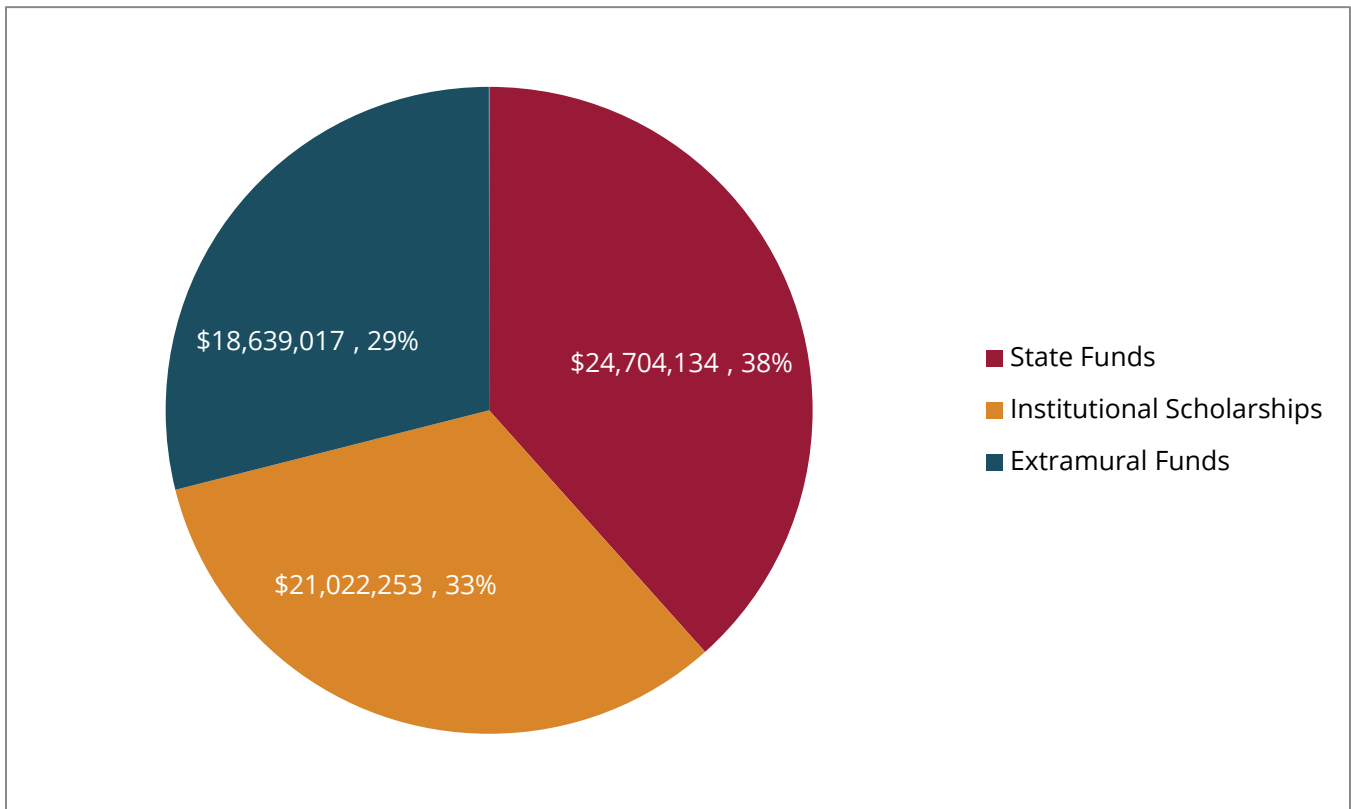
UW-Milwaukee reported the most Fund 402 expenditures - \$2.40 million.

UW-Madison reported the most state GPR expenditures (not including Fund 402) - \$10.79 million.

Excluding UW-Madison and UW-Milwaukee, the following three UW institutions spent the most on M/D programs and scholarships:

- UW-Whitewater \$2.56 million
- UW-La Crosse \$2.28 million
- UW-Stout \$1.99 million

NEED PROFILE BY RACE ETHNICITY

Financial aid is critical to the successful recruitment, retention, and graduation of multicultural and economically disadvantaged students. In 2014-15, an average of \$10,974 in aid was disbursed to 123,103 UW System student financial aid recipients (see, Table 2). The total number of financial aid recipients declined by 1,209 since the last report in 2013-14. In the UW System, 18,445 underrepresented minority students received financial aid, representing an increase of 486 recipients since the 2013-14 report. During the same period, 89% of underrepresented minority student aid recipients had demonstrated financial need, based on the Federal Needs analysis methodology, while 74% of white recipients had demonstrated financial need.

Underrepresented minority students on average had greater financial need (\$18,994), than non-underrepresented minority students (\$15,294). Of the aid awarded to underrepresented racial/ethnic minority students, 48% was in the form of loans and 51% was in the form of grants, with the remaining consisting of work aid. In contrast, 69% of aid was in the form of loans and 30% was in the form of grants for white students.
