Profile of Dr. Roger Haro

Professor, Biology, University of Wisconsin-La Crosse 2014 Regents' Diversity Award Recipient

Highlights from nomination materials:

- Professor of Biology and Assistant Director of the River Studies Center, UW-La Crosse (2005-present).
- Director, UW-La Crosse Ronald E. McNair Post-Baccalaureate Program (2009-present). The program provides eligible students with support and preparation for graduate school. Dr. Haro initiated using Equity Scorecard institution-specific data to inform programming decisions in the grant application; the program has been successfully renewed through 2018.
- Director, First-Year Research Exposure (FYRE) Program, UW-La Crosse (2012-present). FYRE is a three-year pilot aimed at retaining first-year science students; it annually serves 10 to 12 historically underrepresented students, preparing them to negotiate "gateway" science and math courses that often pose challenges to retention in STEM (science, technology, engineering, and mathematics) disciplines.
- Instrumental in UW-L and other UW institutions becoming pilot sites for the Equity Scorecard project, a data-driven method to evaluate equity in access, retention, academic excellence, and institutional receptivity between students of color and their majority peers.
- A leader among faculty in promoting a broad spectrum of diversity issues at UW-L, serving numerous times as chair of the Joint Minority Affairs Committee; serves as a mentor to many students, faculty and staff; has initiated grant proposals resulting in millions of dollars in funding and additional research opportunities.
- Nominated three times by Students Advocating for Potential Ability for Most Accessible Instructor Award.

In Dr. Roger Haro's own words:

• "My endeavors aimed at increasing academic opportunities for first-generation students and those of color would not have been possible without the collaborative support of the talented and generous people serving UW-L as members of its staff, faculty and administration. I have never been told, 'We can't do that here,' rather I've only been asked, 'what's next.' UW-L has provided a rich and vibrant environment that has allowed me to pursue this 'third leg' of my professional career without relinquishing my instructional and scholarly activities."
