# PROMOTING CIVIL DISCOURSE & FREEDOM OF EXPRESSION

# **REQUESTED ACTION**

Item for information and discussion.

### SUMMARY

The Universities of Wisconsin take pride in their commitment to academic freedom and freedom of expression. Each university works throughout the academic year to cultivate an atmosphere on campus where these freedoms are protected and cherished. Our campuses host a number of events throughout the year where speakers with different viewpoints can be heard, where robust and civil dialogue is both modeled and taught, and where the true value of these freedoms beyond the classroom is on display.

This presentation will include a discussion of these efforts as detailed in the 2022-2023 Annual Freedom of Expression and Academic Freedom Report. It will also include a presentation by the UWs Vice President for University Relations as well as the leadership of the newly created Wisconsin Institute for Citizenship and Civil Dialogue (WICCD) on the efforts occurring on the Universities of Wisconsin campuses to promote freedom of expression and civil dialogue. Finally, the Chancellors of UW-Madison and UW-Superior will also present on the activities happening on their individual campuses. In addition, several legislators will be invited to participate.

The 2023-28 Strategic Plan adopted by the Board of Regents on Dec. 8, 2022, also includes a commitment to expanding efforts on freedom of expression and civil dialogue, including the formation of WICCD.

### Previous Action or Discussion

On October 6, 2017, the Board approved Regent Policy Document 4-21, "Commitment to Academic Freedom and Freedom of Expression."

Regent Policy Document (RPD) 4-21, "Commitment to Academic Freedom and Freedom of Expression" affirms the UW System Board of Regents' longstanding support of academic freedom and freedom of expression. RPD 4-21 recognizes that each of the Universities of Wisconsin has a "solemn responsibility not only to promote lively and fearless exploration, deliberation, and debate of ideas, but also to protect those freedoms when others attempt to restrict them." Each chancellor is responsible for implementing the provisions of this policy.

In accordance with RPD 4-21, UW Administration has prepared its annual report describing system-wide methods, activities and events which inform and support campus communities in their efforts to protect the academic freedom and freedom of expression rights of students and employees. This report provides a sample of events and activities that occurred between July 1, 2022 and June 30, 2023. To collect information for this report, the Office of Compliance and Integrity surveyed the universities via a questionnaire<sup>1</sup>.

# Efforts to Support & Affirm Commitment to Academic Freedom and Freedom of Expression

The Universities of Wisconsin were asked to describe any activity endorsed on their campus affirming a commitment to and support of academic freedom and freedom of expression principles. This report is intended to share some high-level examples of such activities. As set forth in Attachment A, universities have engaged in a wide variety of activities consistent with RPD 4-21 (See Attachment A, Section I).

# Public Presentations on Academic Freedom and Freedom of Expression

A number of universities reported hosting presentations and discussions open to the campus community addressing topics related to academic freedom and freedom of expression. For example:

- The Menard Center for Constitutional Studies (MCCS) at UW-Eau Claire (UWEC) incorporates programming that focuses on the First Amendment. The center hosted multiple events over the past year including the following examples:
  - Constitution Day Address at UW-Eau Claire Barron County, featuring Dr. Eric Kasper.
  - "Censorship, Free Speech, and the Constitution" panel at UW-Eau Claire, with co-sponsorship from the student Pre-Law Club. The discussion was led by Nadine Strossen, former president of the American Civil Liberties Union, in dialogue with a UWEC panel featuring Dr. Teresa O'Halloran; Dr. David Shih; Dr. Selika Ducksworth-Lawton; and student Josh E.
  - "Free Speech, the Supreme Court, and John Stuart Mill" with presenters Drs. Eric Kasper and Troy Kozma.
  - Author Wilfred Reilly for a presentation titled "Taboo, Free Speech, and Facts We Can't Talk About" with an introduction by UWEC's Dr. Peter Myers.
- UW-Green Bay offered a series of events for Constitution Day including circulation of the "Freedom of Expression FAQ;" a speaker panel discussing freedom of expression and academic freedom; and education regarding resources to address concerns.
- UW-Green Bay hosted a panel discussion, "Democracy Matters" with Professor Aaron Weinschenk; Reid Ribble, former U.S. Representative (WI); and Dick Gephardt, former U.S. House Majority Leader discussing the current state of democracy in the United States.
- UW-La Crosse hosted a session for all faculty, staff, students, and community members titled "Free Speech & Campus Discourse." Presenters responded to questions from the host regarding various aspects of free speech and academic freedom.
- UW-Madison held a "Forum on Campus Speech" sponsored by PROFS and ASPRO (non-profit professional organizations for faculty and academic staff), featuring the UW System President, a state senator, and two UW-Madison faculty members.
- UW-Milwaukee (UWM) hosted Wisconsin Lt. Gov. Debates with Michael Best Strategies and Spectrum 1 News, moderated by WisPolitics. The debates were a unique opportunity to reinforce UWM's larger RPD 4-21 efforts in promoting diverse viewpoints in a public venue on campus to model civil dialogue. This event was sponsored by UWM Marketing and Communications.
- UW Oshkosh hosted a panel discussion on the results of the UW System Survey on Free Speech and Civil Dialogue.

- UW-Parkside presented "An Evening with James Carville & Mary Matalin: Thriving in Times of Political Polarization."
- UW-Platteville offered an informational presentation followed by a Q&A by UW System Legal entitled "Freedom of Speech and Discrimination Issues."
- UW-River Falls Chalmer Davee Library hosted a Constitution Day Display and celebrated 60 years as a member of the Federal Depository Library Program. The library hosted a historical display highlighting materials provided by the US Government Publishing Office, as well as a display on the US Constitution, and distributed free copies of the Constitution. The event also included a virtual book display.
- In a Free Speech Week event hosted by the Menards Center for the Study of Institutions and Innovation, main speaker Chris Finan (National Coalition Against Censorship) discussed his new book "How Free Speech Saved Democracy."
- UW-Superior's Jackets Vote held a two-part event around Monica Guzman's book "I Never Thought of it That Way: to Have Fearlessly Curious Conversations in Dangerously Divided Times." The two activities included a panel titled "I Never Thought of it That Way," as well as a small group book club.

# Engaging Campus Leadership

Leadership across the Universities of Wisconsin demonstrated a commitment to promoting lively and fearless exploration, deliberation, and debate of ideas, while also protecting those freedoms when others attempt to restrict them. From year to year, leadership across the Universities of Wisconsin continue to invest in education, resources, and support on this topic. For example:

- UW-Eau Claire welcomed the Wisconsin State Assembly Committee on Colleges and Universities for a public hearing to discuss the state of free expression on university campuses and hear detailed analysis of the 2022 UW System Student Free Expression Survey. Chancellor Jim Schmidt's testimony addressed the university's enduring commitment to free expression and viewpoint diversity.
- UW-Madison's Student Affairs has a team of staff who help manage protests. They are trained by the Office of Student Conduct and Community Standards to be aware of how to preserve free expression. Individual training meetings are held throughout the year.
- UW-Madison's "Challenging Conversations" by the Center for Teaching Learning & Mentoring, Division for Teaching & Learning, offers professional development for instructors to learn strategies to engage with students on controversial topics in learning spaces.
- UW-Milwaukee reported that many course syllabi include statements on class conduct such as "being respectful of others' opinions, experiences, perspectives, and identities that are expressed in the classroom setting" or "A note on discussion: some of the issues raised are personal, important, and contentious. We will not

overlook the contentious aspects of the debates, but in this class – more than in most – you will be expected to be considerate, responsive, and mature....; only by treating one another with respect can we discuss such potentially fraught issues." Sponsored by various UWM Colleges.

- UW-Whitewater's LEARN Center offered book clubs on Becoming a Student-Ready College and The Empowered University.
- UW-Stevens Point hosted a "Free Speech Forum" sponsored by Student Government Association, College Democrats and College Republicans. Experts and students participated in a round-table discussion about the UW System free speech survey, campus expression, and how to best engage in civil dialogue in an academic setting.

The UW System President has also led the effort system-wide to create more opportunities for all UW System students and employees to engage in civil dialogue and promote freedom of expression and academic freedom. Specifically, in June of 2022, President Jay Rothman initiated a new project called the "Civil Dialogue Project" intended to advance the UW System's efforts under RPD 4-21 and minimize barriers to education, resources, and support in freedom of expression and academic freedom protections. President Rothman charged a small UW System working group to develop a plan for enhancing student and employee education, resources and events surrounding civil discourse and free speech protections throughout the UW System. Four main working groups comprised of systemwide leadership and stakeholders worked on the project through the FY22-23 calendar year, leading to the creation of a UW System website dedicated to Civil Dialogue as well as a variety of events held at campus locations to promote civil discourse and engagement among students. In addition to this Project, President Rothman has personally been engaging in this initiative by meeting privately with student leaders across the Universities of Wisconsin to discuss the importance of civil dialogue and hear from students regarding their own experiences.

### Training and Workshops

Several institutions reported training programs and/or courses on topics of free speech and freedom of expression. Some highlights include:

- The Menard Center for Constitutional Studies and the UW-Eau Claire Center for Excellence in Teaching and Learning co-sponsored a panel for faculty titled "Teach with Free Speech: Academic Freedom, Public Employee Speech, and Controversial Topics." The panel was moderated by Phil Rechek and featured Dr. Damir Kovačević, Dr. Adam Kunz, Dr. Eric Kasper, and Dr. Teresa O'Halloran.
- The Joint Committee on Free Speech Promotion and Center for Transformative Justice at UW-La Crosse hosted various training sessions during National Free Speech Week including the following examples:

- ADL Free Speech Training on "Free Speech in Policy and Practice." Self-paced online workshop provided faculty and staff participants with knowledge on free speech, counter speech, and academic freedom to build an inclusive campus climate that promotes the free exchange of ideas.
- ADL Free Speech Training on "Free Speech in Campus Discourse." Self-paced online workshop for students focused on the importance of free speech and academic freedom on a college campus; dispel myths concerning what is protected speech (and what is not); and tips for managing prominent speakers, political protests, and hate speech.
- UW-Madison's Office of Legal Affairs offered First Amendment and Social Media training for UW-Madison communicators, including training for students enrolled in a Social Work course.
- UW-Stout offered a Student Free Speech Workshop sponsored by MCSII and facilitated by Tim Shiell. Students discussed how RPD 4-21 applies to a variety of real-life cases from UW campuses.
- UW-Whitewater offered training on the Constitution to the Whitewater Student Government, which was publicly posted on Facebook and Instagram.

## **Policies and Resources**

In addition to RPD 4-21 and System Administration policies, several universities have university-level policies and/or specific published resources that inform students and employees on academic freedom and freedom of expression rights and responsibilities. A great deal of information is also contained on university external and internal websites in addition to student handbooks. For example:

- UW-La Crosse's Murphy Library provides and online resource guide on the U.S. Constitution and Constitution Day.
- UW-Madison has a website dedicated to "Free Expression at UW-Madison," which includes general information, policies, resources and FAQs on First Amendment rights and protections.
- UW-Madison has posted protest guidelines for students and employees on the campus policy library, readily available to all campus community members. The campus protest guidelines are also permanently listed in the Center for Leadership and Involvement Student Organization Resource & Policy Guide and are frequently linked to in messages to student organizations.
- UW-Parkside is drafting a document called "UW-Parkside's Commitment to Academic Freedom and Freedom of Expression in Teaching and Learning" to provide clarity for faculty, instructors, and co-curricular staff about how academic freedom and freedom of speech interact in a teaching context.

### **Barriers to Academic Freedom and Freedom of Expression**

UW System universities were asked to identify any material barriers that impacted their efforts to uphold academic freedom and freedom of expression and steps taken to remove those barriers. In response to the survey and questionnaire, there were no reported barriers during this reporting period of July 1, 2022 through June 30, 2023.

### Formal Complaints and Violations of RPD 4-21

Under RPD 4-21, any student who has twice been found responsible for misconduct that materially and substantially disrupted the free expression of others shall be suspended for a minimum of one semester. Any student found responsible a third time is required to be expelled. However, these specific provisions of the policy are not currently in force due to legal concerns and the lack of administrative rule governing the penalty. Instead, the current version of the policy requires the chancellor of a UW System institution to report directly to the Board any instance where the institution does not suspend or expel a student whom the institution has found responsible on two or more occasions of disrupting the expressive rights of others. Employees charged with disrupting the freedom of expression of others are subject to procedures under Ch. UWS 18, Wis. Admin. Code and UW System institution policies.

As part of the annual academic freedom and freedom of expression report, RPD 4-21 requires UW System to include a description of any formal complaints of violations of these freedoms during the reporting period and the administrative response to the complaint, including any disciplinary proceedings involving students or employees. During the 2022-23 academic year there were two formal complaints (one student and one employee).

- On October 17, 2022, a student organization at UW-Milwaukee filed a complaint stating that it had put posters out for an event and found that several posters had been damaged or destroyed. UW-Milwaukee's Dean of Students Office met with the complaining parties and worked with UWM Police Department (UWMPD) to review available camera footage. UWMPD reviewed videos of those spaces, but the responsible party was not identified.
- On December 14, 2022, an informational handout was left around a meeting room at a UW-River Falls Faculty Senate meeting, with no explanation. The author of the document and its appropriateness was challenged by another employee. The UW-River Falls Faculty Grievance Committee reviewed the situation, and the recommendation was for the supervisor to address the issue as an employee performance matter.

### Notification Requirements (to Students, Employees, and in New Student Orientation)

Under RPD 4-21, universities must provide specific notifications to students and employees about the rights, protections, and responsibilities under RPD 4-21. For example, the university must provide RPD 4-21 policy information in orientation materials (including student handbooks and planners) for freshmen and transfer students entering the institution. Universities must also provide an annual notice to all students and employees on RPD 4-21. This notice is usually provided through emails, website postings, and social media. A summary of this information is provided in Attachment A Section II. A few examples of such notifications include, but are not limited to:

- At UW-Eau Claire, during the fall orientation convocation, all incoming first year and transfer students viewed the university's Freedom of Speech video that featured constitutional law experts, student and administrator voices, and excerpts from free speech-related events held on campus. The video was coordinated by the Menard Center for Constitutional Studies with support from their donors and the Institute for Humane Studies and produced by Volume One. The video was viewed by all incoming students in attendance.
- UW-Green Bay provided all incoming first year students with Freedom of Expression documentation. A Freedom of Expression frequently asked question (FAQ) document which includes information regarding demonstrations, time, place and manner restrictions, and permissible speech on college campuses was developed and distributed. The FAQ also specifically addresses religious freedom and how to effectuate a student's rights on that issue.
- UW-Green Bay ensures all students receive an email providing the University Statement on Civility, noting specifically that public institutions of higher education must provide the opportunity for all people to grow and develop as human beings, acquire knowledge, search for truth, and have the full freedom to display their values. It also noted that UW-Green Bay's commitment to engagement in civil discourse is guided by its internal polices and those established by the Board of Regents through RPD 4-21; UW-Green Bay's Civility and Inclusivity Statement; and UW-Green Bay's Harassment and Discrimination Policy. The communication contained contact information for the Office of Human Resources and Workforce Diversity.
- UW-La Crosse's New Student Orientation covers freedom of expression. All incoming students hear about and see the contents of the Freedom of Expression institutional webpages.
- UW-Madison's Center for Leadership and Involvement sent a message to the primary contacts of all Registered Student Organizations (RSO) that included campus protest guidelines.
- During the summer of 2022, many new students at UW-Milwaukee Enrollment Management/Dean of Student Office completed a required online orientation course via Canvas. Students included were among populations that were not required to attend in-person orientation programs where the content is delivered in

the presentation. In the Online Orientation, there is a Health and Safety module which includes a "Freedom of Expression & FERPA" page where the link to RPD 4-21 is listed. Students must complete the entire Online Orientation before they can enroll in courses.

- UW-Oshkosh's Vice Chancellor for Student Affairs sent an email to all students sharing important university policies, including RPD 4-21, "Commitment to Academic Freedom and Freedom of Expression."
- UW-Parkside reported sending an electronic newsletter called the Midnight Ranger weekly to all enrolled students, with the Student Handbook linked which includes the policy on Academic Freedom and Freedom of Expression.
- UW-Platteville requires any campus wide event that involves a display sign to be approved. When a display sign is posted, that indicates the event is approved. If there are concerns with the content, the hosts of the event should be contacted.
- UW-River Falls Provost David Travis emailed faculty and staff about "Supporting Your Academic Freedom in the Classroom."
- UW-Stevens Point's New Student Orientation included a presentation covering a variety of topics including RPD 4-21. Dean of Students Troy Seppelt addressed the policy in detail.
- UW-Stout's Chancellor Frank emailed faculty and staff regarding "University Compliance Reminders."
- UW-Superior ensures that a policy statement called "Academic Freedom Defined" is included in written material that is distributed to all first-year students and transfers.
- UW-Whitewater offers The Dear World Workshop during Fall Warhawk Welcome Orientation Program for all new freshmen and transfer students. During the workshop, students were able to reflect on an impactful moment that tells their story as respective individuals and allow them to break down barriers internally and with one another. Students were able to think and hear different perspectives while given the opportunity to engage in reflective conversations.

In conclusion, the Universities of Wisconsin are committed to the promotion and support of academic freedom and freedom of expression rights and principles through a variety of information, resources, activities, and events to promote academic freedom and freedom of expression in accordance with RPD 4-21. As I have publicly stated, "Our universities must be places where all students, no matter their background or world view, can express opinions and beliefs. It is this exchange of ideas that creates knowledge so critical to our future here in Wisconsin." Copies provided to:

## UNIVERSITIES OF WISCONSIN EAB NAVIGATE OVERVIEW

### **REQUESTED ACTION**

For information and discussion.

#### SUMMARY

The Universities of Wisconsin mission centers on student success. Our largest student success initiative is the Navigate student success management system that launched in 2019 with a multi-year contract, which has been extended through 2028. In the first several years, the Universities of Wisconsin have expanded implementation and strategic use of Navigate to help faculty and staff provide timely, evidence-based interventions; to equip students with vital tools and resources; and to help UW universities support overall student success and close equity gaps. This presentation will illustrate the overall use and impacts, as well as specific examples from UW universities.

Dr. Julie Amon, Associate Vice President for Enrollment & Student Success, will provide an overview of the EAB Navigate student success management system and its three components: a faculty and staff platform, a student app, and analytics. Additionally, Dr. Amon will explain how the use of Navigate aligns with the 2023-2028 Strategic Plan, as well as the 360 Advising initiative introduced as a system-level priority in the 2020*FWD* Strategic Framework. Dr. Amon will also introduce how students, staff, and faculty are using Navigate functions to support student retention and completion.

Dr. Ben Passmore, Associate Vice President for Policy Analysis & Research, will provide a brief history of our adoption of Navigate and will discuss how Navigate is a data-driven and actionable tool to help advance proactive, coordinated student support to address challenges such as stagnant retention and graduation rates and persistent achievement gaps. He will share data on student utilization of Navigate and the engagement of faculty and staff. Most importantly, he will discuss impacts and the return on investment, such as an increase in retention for students of concern who engaged with faculty and staff successfully through the Navigate platform.

The main portion of the presentation will follow, with examples of how three UW universities are using Navigate to further their retention, student success, and achievement goals. Student success professionals will talk about how they have implemented effective

intervention plans, differentiated advising, strategic communications, and a coordinated care network. In addition, two students will share what Navigate looks like from their perspective and how it is helping them on their educational journey.

#### BACKGROUND

The Universities of Wisconsin launched our largest student success initiative in 2019 with an investment in EAB's Navigate student success management system. Interest in Navigate originated with the advising community across our universities and now engages a wide array of faculty and staff to better collaborate and assist students throughout the student life cycle.

UW-Eau Claire, UW-Milwaukee, UW Oshkosh, and UW-Platteville already were using Navigate. Several other UW universities also expressed an interest in this type of technology. The Universities of Wisconsin Administration was able to negotiate a favorable contract to lower the cost to the four universities already using Navigate and to provide an affordable entry for an additional eight UW universities to adopt Navigate. UW-Madison leaders opted to continue using different student success management tools to meet their university's needs.

The University of Wisconsin System Board of Regents approved the initial investment in December 2018, and the launch followed in February 2019. As planned, implementation and use of Navigate has been phased in to align with university strategic priorities, needs, and capacity over the subsequent five years. The Navigate student success management system provides students with a strong network of timely and high-touch support to ensure their academic progression to degree completion.

Based on successes to date, the Board of Regents in June 2023 approved the renewal and extension of the EAB Navigate contract for another five years from Dec. 31, 2023, through Dec. 30, 2028. The investment aligns with the <u>2023-2028 Strategic Plan</u> approved by the Board of Regents in December 2022, which includes an objective to "champion student success across the higher education life cycle." Navigate also supports advising— particularly <u>360 Advising strategies</u>—as well as enrollment management and provision of strategic data to administrators, faculty, and staff.

The initiative remains a collaborative effort between the Universities of Wisconsin administration and our UW universities to support student success systemwide.
